Testing

We don't teach to the test but we prepare all students to meet the literacy and numeracy demands in the 21st century. It is significant to note that our 2015 results released at the My School Website showed how well our students are achieving. We are achieving better than like schools in Year 9. Indeed an examination of the data shows we are competitive with some schools with significantly better socio economic indexes. Parents who wish to see more detailed information are welcome to ask me for a fact sheet on our results.

Year 7

The staff at Balcatta have all remarked on the quality of our Year 7 students' attitude. I must agree in reviewing classes that they have been well mannered, attentive and very cohesive. The Year 7 Camp held at Dwellingup was a wonderful opportunity for students to build on those key relationships. I commend the great work being done by all our student services team led by Tegan Walker, Kevin Castensen, Sonia Hatzis and Joanne Keep.

Looking forward

Teacher Sidelined

In the first Year 11 Human Biology Topic – Cells, students learnt about the structure and function of cells, the various mechanisms that facilitated the supply of materials and factors affecting the exchange of materials across the cell membrane including surface area to volume ratio, concentration gradients, and the physical and chemical nature of the materials being exchanged.


At the conclusion of this topic students worked collaboratively in small groups to design mini lessons to present to their peers to reinforce the learning that had occurred.

The guidelines included preparing a 10-minute presentation to the whole class that focused on particular content areas.

All groups worked collaboratively in coming up with wonderful learning activities for their peers. They integrated technology through the use of electronic presentations making use of the classroom digital projector system and their BYOD devices. Video segments showing animations of cellular concepts prepared by experts in the field of cellular biology were featured along with commentary presented by the students.

One group gave a spectacular hands-on practical demonstration of diffusion utilizing different coloured lollies sitting in petri dishes of water. After a short time, the lollies dissolved and the spread of the colouring from the lollies throughout the water in the petri dish made an astounding visual representation of the vital concept of diffusion.

During this activity their teacher sat on the sidelines feeling a little superfluous in the face of the peer tutoring that was taking place.

On Monday, 21st March, Year 7 students boarded a bus to Dwellingup's Nanga Bush Camp for a three-day camp.
