We are also pleased to have welcomed a new group of Year 7 students into the school and other new students who have enrolled in other year groups. We are particularly pleased at how well the new students have settled into the school, and we continue to encourage all students to do their best academically, socially and in their physical activities. Balcatta Senior High School offers a variety of different pathways to students to help them achieve and reach their full potential. All of our courses provide an engaging, challenging and creative curriculum that gives each and every student the opportunity to achieve his or her potential. We also look forward to the exciting and creative work of our special Gifted and Talented Visual Arts students.

Student Success

Congratulations to our 2017 Year 12 students on their results in both ATAR and VET studies. There were many successes in the 2017 results. One of our students Ruthvik Devarapalli achieved an outstanding ATAR of 99.5 which placed him in the top 1% of ATAR achievement in the state. Our attainment rate of 98% was excellent. 89% of our students achieved a Certificate II or higher in their VET studies. Seven students achieved an ATAR of over 80, with 13% of our Year 12 ATAR students performing in the top third of the state.

Community Events

This term there have been a number of events that have provided an opportunity to meet with parents and caregivers of our students, to outline the school's activities and operations and more importantly, discuss their child's progress. The school hosted an enjoyable and successful pool party and we were delighted that we were able to meet many parents informally at the start of the year. This was followed by our successful and well-attended parent information evenings for Years 7 to 12 where parents were able to find out more about the school, its facilities, the courses offered and to meet members of the administration team and teachers.

Harmony Day is a special and important day on the school calendar. It is on this day, 21 March, that staff, students and the whole community acknowledge and celebrate our cultural diversity. At Balcatta Senior High School, we take special pride in our cultural community and pay respect to the wealth of their cultural, religious and ethnic diversity. This year's activities focused particularly on our Year 7 students and included dance sessions, Faces of Balcatta, black and white photography portraits, Music World, My Story and Harmony Wings created by the Arts Department.

Academic Performance

As Term 1 comes to an end, it is important for students (and their parents) to reflect on their progress. Getting off to a good start academically is very important and I am pleased with the effort teachers have made in Term 1 to ensure all students are getting sound teaching and learning. Interim reports were sent out during the term and parents were invited to separate meetings with staff for Years 7 to 12 students to discuss their child's progress and achievement in Term 1. These sessions were well-attended and we were delighted to receive positive feedback and many questions from parents about what their son/daughter has achieved to date, and the important things they needed to do from this point to continue to improve their results.

Inaugural Music Program

The Years 7 and 8 Music and the Year 11 Certificate II in Creative Industries (Music) courses are underway in the school for the first time this year, with full classes. This is a very exciting new program at the school and includes voice, guitar and band combinations. Instrumental Music School Services (IMSS) are providing tutors for the students and these have already commenced and are being well-received by the students. Students have already performed successfully to full houses in

the Performing Arts Theatre on Harmony Day and many more performances are planned for future school events.

School Upgrade

In 2017, the State Government announced a \$50 million upgrade for the school. Planning is underway to upgrade and improve the facilities. To date, there have been three meetings with Hassell architects and representatives from the Department of Education. The school has also been provided with sketch drawings, a project plan and a schematic design for the new facilities and buildings. It is hoped that Balcatta Senior High School will be in a position to enable future growth of our student population to 1,075 students. The rebuilding will provide state of the art facilities and refurbishment of the heritage status buildings. The key stakeholders in the project include the School and School Board, the Heritage Council of WA, the Department of Finance, Building, Management and Works, the City of Stirling, the Project Design Team and the Balcatta community.

The first stage of this building process is proposed to commence in 2019. More updates will follow as the plan and timelines are finalised.

Gifted and Talented Visual Arts

2019 marks the 40th anniversary of our Gifted and Talented Visual Arts Program at Balcatta Senior High School. This program has a long, distinguished creative history at the school and has many eminent graduates from the program in the community and across Australia. Planning is underway to commemorate this important anniversary where we will be able to meet and celebrate with current students and their parents and former students of this program. Further details will become available on the school's website in the coming months.

I look forward to an exciting and productive year, working with the School Board, staff, students and the parent community in offering the best personal education to each and every one of our students. There are many plans and activities on our calendar for 2018 and it very important that we, as a community, keep our strong focus on the important academic, physical, emotional and personal well-being of all our students.



Skill Hire Scholarship

Balcatta Senior High School has entered into an exciting new partnership agreement with Skill Hire. This is a prestigious scholarship program involving theory and practical elements with a focus on bricklaying, carpentry as well as a significant workplace component. They will utilise some work areas in M Block on Fridays for Certificate II Building and Construction (trade pathways). The following Year 11 students were interviewed for this scholarship program: Lyric Heke, Jack Carter, Ruben Sassine, Izel Fortun and Jordan Maton-Patia.

The Construction Training Fund (CTF) has selected up to 200 WA students to become the building and construction industry's first choice to employ as an apprentice/trainee. Skill Hire WA is one of the successful Registered Training Organisations delivering this program under the 52824 WA Certificate II Building and Construction (Pathway – Trades) in four different locations including Balcatta Senior High School.

The Scholarship includes the following:

- Tuition, RTO enrolment and resources costs
- Safety equipment and clothing
- Work experience
- Regular mentoring by industry personnel
- Specialist workshops about building and construction
- Advice about career pathways
- Meetings with industry employers regular reports to parents and schools.

The program is supported by the industry and will provide participants with the skills, experience and knowledge that employers look for in a new apprentice or trainee.

The School

Vocational, Education and Training (VET)

Many students are taking advantage of training opportunities off campus during 2018. Students are participating in qualifications such as:

- Population Health preparation for Nursing
- Screen and Media
- Hairdressing
- Automotive
- Information Technology

Course options vary from year to year but are typically one year in length. Students can apply for qualifications that suit their interests and future goals to enhance their educational experiences through senior school. Often participation in these qualifications confirms their career goals and sets students on their training pathway.

Years 11 and 12 students who are attending Workplace Learning are also completing Log Books and Skills Journals to document their experiences. This semester, students have been placed in radio, office work, child care, plumbing and metal fabrication workplaces, to name a few.

Our students always represent our school in a positive light. Host employers say they are polite, hard-working and great ambassadors for the school. Years 11 and 12 students will complete their first placement requirements at the end of this term and will be required to do a further 55 hours in a second placement in Term 3.

In preparation for selecting Year 11 courses and off campus trade-based experiences, a group of Year 10 students completed their White Card training at Joondalup with Paragon Corporate Training, a company specialising in training delivery for school students. All students completed the training successfully and are now eligible to undertake work experience and qualification training in a construction work-site context.

'The Right Track' presentation

On Thursday 15 March, Year 8 students listened to Jonathan Beninca, representing the Public Transport Authority with The Right Track program, speak about the consequences of antisocial behaviour on the public transport system. This program is all about safer travel and encourages young passengers to become more responsible for their own safety and to make positive choices.

Jonathan Beninca was a typical teenager, and thought he was invincible. When he was 19, Jonathan was out one night catching up with friends and missed his last train home. Jonathan made the choice to jump down on the tracks and throw rocks at the stationary trains as he walked home. His next recollection was waking up in hospital, minus his right arm and a leg, as well as some fingers on his left hand. He later discovered that one of those rocks had rebounded with enough force to crack his skull and knock him unconscious on the tracks, where the first train of the morning found him.

While his dangerous short-cut changed his life forever, he now visits teenagers to speak to them about the consequences of unsafe choices and anti-social behaviour on or around public transport.

The Right Track program brings Jonathan to Perth twice a year to visit lots of schools and youth organisations to tell his story in the hopes of saving people from making dangerous choices and ending up as a double amputee like him, or worse. His interesting, funny, and at times, gruesome tale covers things like the difference between a good friend who tells you not to do crazy things and a bad friend who might egg you on; how his injury has affected his family, friends and the people who responded first, such as the train driver and transit officers.

Members of the debating club also participate in weekly preparation classes, co-ordinated by Ms Amy Blitvich, on Tuesday mornings.

Debating improves students' confidence, public speaking, general knowledge, analytical thinking, argument construction and overall written and verbal literacy. The competition, which runs during Terms 1 and 2, provides students with an opportunity to engage in real world issues and complex problems in a fun and engaging setting. Students are encouraged to discuss big picture ideas and formulate solutions to a variety of contemporary challenges in areas such as health, education, government, technology and the media.

During Term 1, students participated in two rounds of the competition, on Tuesday 13 March and Tuesday 27 March. All students who spoke represented the school incredibly well and looked very sharp in their formal school uniform – including blazers and ties. A big congratulations should be extended to these students for their bravery and excellent ambassadorship in representing our school community.


