This term we welcome Emma Schrader who has joined us as a new sculptor tutor. She describes what she is doing with her group:

The students are responding to the theme of 'Cabinet of Curiosities' through learning simple casting and mould making techniques. Students will be creating a small collection of their own curious objects, using plaster and wax. So far, we have cast body parts in plaster bandage and then went on to extend, join together or manipulate these casts to create a curious object. Students will continue to build up a collection of objects through mould making with clay and wax. In the upcoming weeks, they will decide on how to arrange and display their curious collection.

Our year 7 and 8 students have been busy exploring and developing ideas for a collaborative mural that they will complete this term. Once the mural is finished it will be displayed on the wall near the art courtyard.

Inspiration for their artwork came from a recent excursion to South Fremantle to view public art. The students viewed an 80 metre long mural on the frontage of a furniture warehouse titled 'EAST WEST DESIGN'. Artist Graham Miles Richards is nearing completion of his labour of love Trompe L'oeil mural painting. Our students had the opportunity to meet with the artist to discuss his work as an artist. Graham has agreed to come to school in the coming weeks to offer our students advice about taking a small design and scaling it up to a large scale mural.
