From The Principal

As the end of the year approaches, it is very pleasing to see how well all the students have participated in their academic studies.

Well what a year it has been and it is very fitting that the only Bulletin we have been able to publish this year is titled 'Reflections 2020'.

This year as a community we were faced with the enormity of COVID-19, which impacted us all. It was very challenging at a school level, ensuring everyone was safe and student learning continued. Staff provided work packages or on-line lessons. Many events had to be cancelled or could not be actioned due to the restrictions of COVID-19.

Balcatta SHS was chosen as one of the schools to participate in the Telethon Kids Institute DETECT Schools study 'Wellbeing Survey'. This provided the opportunity for feedback on the impact of COVID-19 on the physical, social and emotional well-being of our school community. The data from this survey will be shared once it has been released.

The new building program is still progressing. We first moved into the new Technology block at the start of Term 2 and the North block (Amelia Street) at the start of Term 4. It was a mammoth undertaking, packing up and moving virtually the whole school in readiness for the start of Term 4. The students were excited and explored the new building. The rooms are bright, open, contemporary learning spaces. It has been so pleasing to see the engagement by teachers and students of the various flexible spaces, especially our temporary 'pop-up library'. The Science has been demolished and work in the A and B Blocks will continue during the holidays.

Education Support

A significant part of the refurbishment is the provision for purpose rooms to accommodate the new Education Support Program at Balcatta SHS. The appointment of Associate Principal Ms Cathie Bonner has been a driving force in developing and promoting the launch of the new Education Support Program. The program will provide a comprehensive education experience for students with special needs. This exemplifies our inclusive and diversified student community and how we value difference.

Year 12 Presentation Ceremony

We farewelled the Year 12 Class of 2020 at the Presentation Ceremony on Tuesday 20 October at the Octagon Theatre, University of Western Australia. There were many highlights of the evening, including performances from two of our very talented music students, Callum Case-McGlade (Year 9) and Lucy Scales (Year 10). The speeches from the Year 12 Form teachers were special and personalised as they acknowledged their group of students.

A key theme coming through was the care and a sense of pride that the Form teachers had for their group. I would like

to acknowledge our Year 12 leaders Neeyanta Nakarmi and Leann Ryle Abastillas.

They have been exemplary ambassadors, representing the school and the student body for 2020. Congratulations to all special award and course award winners. After a long illness, it was with great sadness we bade farewell to Beverley Mae Dainton, an Education Support Officer at Balcatta SHS. Because of COVID restrictions, staff were only able to attend a memorial via Zoom.

Bev worked in education for over twenty years with students from Year 7 to Year 13. She worked at Perth Modern for six years and then moved to Balcatta SHS in 2002 in the Education Support Unit.

Bev held the position of Chairperson of the WA Association of Teacher Assistants (WAATA) and was a member for 15 years. On 26 October 2016, Bev received an award for Outstanding Professional Service for her 10 years' service to WAATA. The award recognised the value of an individual's contribution to education in WA.

Her work at Balcatta SHS consisted of accompanying students to mainstream classes, liaising with teachers regarding IEPs and modified programs, teaching basic Maths/money programs to small groups of ESU students, teaching a life skills program, cooking and jewellery making, as well as managing the Community Access Program. Bev created the Community Access Program to give her students life skills in travel, shopping, money and budgeting, setting up an apartment, safety awareness, caring for a garden and social skills. She gave assistance to her students in certificate courses such as Business, Information Technology and Technology & Enterprise. She also accompanied her students to their work experience placements.

Bev is survived by her husband Harold, their four children, Kylie, Matthew, Scott and Peter, as well as their nine grandchildren.





Balcatta Academic Challenge

On Friday 20 November, the annual Balcatta Academic Challenge took place. The purpose of the challenge is to promote Balcatta Senior High School as a school of choice for talented students. The challenge provided primary school students with the opportunity to experience academic extension and enrichment activities across a variety of learning areas.

The Challenge was designed to encourage local intake primary schools to select and enter their high achieving students to compete on behalf of their school to win the prestigious perpetual trophy, to be displayed at their school, for one year.

Fifty five Year 5 students participated in the Academic Challenge and will also receive an invitation to apply for the 2022 intake of the Academic Extension program. Students competed in five challenges that spanned all Learning Areas:

- Challenge 1 English organised by Ms Duong Solving a mystery challenge
- Challenge 2 Dance organised by Ms Martin and Ms Balic - Dance challenge
- Challenge 3 STEAM organised by Ms Hoy Structure building challenge
- Challenge 4 Science organised by Ms Lucas and Ms Palandri - Rock classification
- Challenge 5 Maths organised by Mr Entwistle -Station challenge

For each challenge, students earned 'points', Tuart Hill 3 earning the most points at the end of the day and were presented with a perpetual trophy for the Balcatta Academic Challenge. Prizes were also awarded to Tuart Hill 2 and Osborne 1 for their outstanding results in the maths challenge. Throughout the day students and teams were acknowledged for demonstrating excellent team work, critical thinking and problem-solving skills.

Lego Therapy Program

The Lego Therapy Program is run weekly by Education Support Officer, Ms Kays. This is a form of therapy where students take turns with assigned roles:

- Engineer in charge of reading and relaying instructions. They must tell the Supplier what pieces to retrieve and tell the Builder how to build the model.
- 2. Supplier in charge of finding the correct Lego pieces. They must listen to the Engineer and figure out which piece to retrieve and give them to the Builder.
- Builder in charge of physically building the model.
 They must listen to instructions provided by the
 Engineer and receive the pieces that are retrieved by the Supplier.

The Director makes sure that everybody is working well together. Usually the Education Support Officer is the Director, depending on how many are in the group.

Playing with Lego in a structured therapy setting promotes social interaction, turn-taking, problem-solving and giving and receiving instructions. It can be used to target goals around language and motor skills. The instructions include the shape, size, colour and how many bumps on the brick. Lego therapy also helps to develop skills in all learning areas and is enjoyed by all who love playing with Lego.







Title: April Showers, May Flowers

My artwork gives off a colourful and playful energy. The bright, warm colours of the flowers pop against the blue background. I carved Lino to create a printing plate with which I created a series of black ink prints. On one of these, I chose to add washes of watercolour to create the effect I was going for. My simple message behind this artwork is that you should be your own version of yourself. As you can see after looking at the print closely, all of the flowers and leaves have some kind of flaw, but together they work in harmony and create a radiant artwork.

Title: Coral Vessel

I used a coiling technique to create my vessel. This involved creating a base and scoring around the outside of it. I then rolled out clay, scored and attached it to this base using slip. I repeated this technique over and over to raise the form. Inspired by the work of Courtney Mattison, I created patterns and attachments such as barnacles and clusters of tubular coral by wrapping clay around the base of a tool. These hollow tubulars became my main focal points as I tried to recreate Mattison's message about coral bleaching and humanity's relationship with the ocean.

Title: Vulnerability

This artwork shows a river mouse hastily tangled within Australian flora. It is a Lino carving, printed on handmade eggshell paper. I worked with various tools to carve intricate shapes and balance negative and positive space. This print represents Australia's bush fire issue in a stylised design. My goals were to experiment with texture and hatching by using different tools and create graphic contrast to prompt the viewer to think about the aftermath of our bushfires.

Torsten taught our students about the fundamentals of drawing and painting, producing these large scale pieces which take reference from the local Shearwater Spoonbill Kingfisher Reserve. Nestled five minutes from the school, students were taken down to the Reserve to draw inspiration and create reference sketches from life to then use as guides for their final landscape painting.

Percent for Art Scheme

Percent for Art Scheme

The State Government's Percent for Art Scheme encourages art in the built environment by using a percentage of a development's overall budget to commission art on new public buildings such as schools, police stations and hospitals.

Western Australian artists are contracted to deliver exciting artwork for major new public buildings under the State Government's Percent for Art Scheme, which requires up to one percent of the construction budget for new works over \$2 million, to be spent on artwork.

The scheme is a State Government initiative started in 1989. It is managed by the Department of Finance in partnership with the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries - which is responsible for arts policy in the State.

Artwork at Balcatta SHS

Artist Simon Gilby has created two artworks for the Stage 2 development of Balcatta Senior High School. These works link together (both physically and conceptually), to the interior and exterior of the new Performing Arts Theatre. The interdependent artworks offer a meaningful response to the site's context and history. Together, they interpret the rich heritage and topography of the school and complement the school's architecture.

The 'Pinnacle' artwork can be found outside the Administration building in Amelia Street. 'Pinnacle' is a cast concrete work referencing the school's emblem – a pinnacle. The piece consists of seven expanded sections, reinterpreting a pinnacle which is embedded into the embankment adjacent to the Performing Arts Theatre. 'Pinnacle' acts as an inspiring entry statement for the school, referencing both the successive processes of sedimentation that have created the pinnacles and the ongoing human occupation of the site over time.


A void created between the individual pinnacle sections reveals a human figure, reminding us of the ancient human connection to the site, as well as the school's more recent layers of meaning and history. At night, the figure within the void is illuminated, creating an ethereal human presence. The edges of the pinnacle sections are faceted, creating an architectural response to the pinnacle's natural organic surface.

Suspended in the three-storey void of the Performing Arts Theatre is 'Cascade', an artwork constructed from handcrafted stainless-steel lace. The piece references the ebb and flow of the sea and is evocative of the waves of human migration and interconnected histories of the school. The artwork consists of layered, computer generated topographies of the inland sea, flowing into a fluted column and arriving at a single solid point hovering above the ground. The highly reflective surface of the work is lit at night to emphasise the dramatic hovering effect.
