## From The Principal

Semester 2 highlighted a number of firsts for our school community, including:

- Year 10 student Charlie MacPherson-Lee was announced as a member of the WA Student Council.
- The return of our first whole school athletics carnival (which has not been possible due to the build and COVID-19). Students were dressed in their house colours and participated in a range of events.
- Year 7 and Year 8 students entered the Prime Minister's Spelling Bee with our students advancing to the State finals.
- Success in the "Australian Geography and History Competition".
   Students performed well with a number achieving Distinctions (top 15% of all students across Australia) and High Distinctions, which placed them in the top 10% of all Australian students.
- The Year 10 HASS students produced a video titled "Winners News Now". was selected as a WA finalist, which resulted in them winning the "People's Choice Award" for the Australiawide competition 2023 Tax, Super and You.
- Our Interschool Athletics team was placed second overall (which was our best performance in a number of years). Award winners on the day were Daniella Santich (Year 9 Champion Girl) and Almozamel Hussein (runner up Year 11/12 Champion Boy).
- Eleven Year 10 students under the guidance of Mr Attey entered the Mix 94.5 Masters Milk Carton Regatta. The students designed and built the boat named "Moo Moo Sharks", which was announced the winner of "People's Choice Award for Best Design".
- Cultural Enrichment experiences provided the opportunity for our students to partake in excursions which facilitated connections with Indigenous peers from different schools. Students were engaged in various cultural aspects such as art, storytelling, career and pathway exploration.
- Year 8 students participated in the "Prime Minister's Innovation Challenge". The students used design thinking to develop initiative solutions to local issues and developed a QR code which contained useful information for the incoming Year 7 students
- The P&C held their first quiz night event. This was a great success with over 100 parents and staff participating and raising \$3,125.58.
- The inaugural "Craft Market" showcased the work from the Education Support students, who have been working throughout the year, showcasing their creativity and dedication, on a range of enterprise craft projects.

### Year 12 Class of 2023

This year we farewelled our largest cohort of Year 12 students on Friday 27 October at the Octagon Theatre, University of Western Australia. The program included our school choir singing the Acknowledgement of Country and a dance performance. This is a significant milestone event for the students and their families where we, as a community, acknowledge the completion of 12 years of schooling. Congratulations to our Year 12 students. We wish them the best and encourage them to always give their "personal best" and strive to reach their dreams.

The Year 12 student leaders Jessica Betti and Sonam Leksel proudly represented the school and students, always upholding our school values of Respect-Unite-Excel.

### **School Opportunities and Events**

Throughout the semester, students from all year groups participated in a range of events (of which some are exclusive to Balcatta SHS). Many of these events have been shared on our various social media platforms; Balcatta Update, Facebook, Instagram, our website and this issue of the Balcatta Bulletin Reflections. A number of the

events demonstrate a commitment as an Act-Belong-Commit school, as we actively promote mental health and well-being. A snapshot of some of the events during Semester 2 include:

- "Write a Book in a Day" showcased students' creativity and their determination in producing a book in 12 hours whilst raising funds for childhood cancer.
- Arts Festival Week which included a whole program of activities such as Book Week, with staff and students dressing up as their favourite character, art activities, dance and music performances.
- Students showcased their talents through the annual Gifted and Talented Visual Art Exhibition, Choreography Nights ("Carpe Noctem") and End of Year Dance ("Ignite") performances, and the annual music performance ("Groove Gala").
- National Science Week included a wide range of events across lower school classes.
- Careers Opportunities actively undertaken by a number of students, including "Try-a-Trade", excursions to TAFE and universities, as well as a number of students from Years 9, 11 and 12 attending Perth's Skill West Career and Employment Expo, which exposed students to an array of educational and professional pathways and the opportunity to interact with industry experts.
- Our student representatives/leaders assisted at sporting events, transition program, Year 5 Academic Challenge and National Science Week.
- Participating and organising activities such as annual Health Expo, Science Fair, House events and competitions.
- Student councillors actively promoting mental health and wellbeing initiatives.
- Numerous incursions and excursions which provided enrichment and extension opportunities for students.

On Thursday 19 October, Balcatta SHS was recognised by the Department of Education and the Minister for International Education, Hon David Templeman MLA. Mr Templeman met with members of the Department of Education Principals Advisory Group to discuss the importance of their role in the Western Australian international education sector. These schools provide education to international students at the beginning of their educational journey in WA, who then become important members of the school community and graduate well-prepared for future study. Mr Templeman presented a certificate to Balcatta SHS for being an Endorsed Provider of International Education.

There have been so many special and significant highlights this semester and I would like to thank the staff who have initiated these opportunities.

Finally, I acknowledge and thank the members of the School Board and P&C Association. These members are all volunteers who give

their time. I value their input and perspective in shaping the direction of our school to improve student outcomes. I wish to personally thank and acknowledge Chair of the Board, Mr Kevin Fraser who announced that he is retiring from this role.

As we finish another school year, I wish all staff and students a relaxing and restful break and look forward to a successful 2024 for all.

### **WA Student Council meeting**

Members of the 2023 WA Student Council have come together to help tackle one of the biggest issues among their peers.

Student Council ambassadors had the unique opportunity to sit down and chat with 2023 Australian of the Year, Taryn Brumfitt. The students met with Ms Brumfitt to discuss body image issues which are affecting students and what they think would help make change within their school communities across the state. Ms Brumfitt's insights and experiences provided invaluable guidance and helped combat the students' concerns.

Year 10 student Charlie MacPherson-Lee sees her role on the council as a platform to amplify the voices of often overlooked students. "Anything to do with student mental health and just making sure students across the board in all of WA are heard is the big thing for me," Charlie said.

### **Cultural Enrichment Experiences**

Throughout this semester, Balcatta Senior High School students participated in a range of cultural experiences. These initiatives opened doors for students to partake in excursions that not only facilitated connections with Indigenous peers from different schools but also facilitated immersive engagements in various cultural facets, such as art, storytelling, career and pathway exploration, and other engaging activities.

### **Yanchep National Park Cultural Day**

The Follow the Dream Outreach Program extended an invitation for students to participate in a captivating cultural appreciation event hosted at the Yanchep National Park. Guided by Uncle Noel Nannup's captivating stories, they actively engaged in activities fostering a deeper connection to their heritage. Spear throwing demonstrations unveiled traditional practices, while yarning circles became spaces for sharing narratives. For Indigenous students, it was a chance to connect with their cultural roots and fellow peers.

#### The University of Western Australia

The University of Western Australia offers a range of programs and initiatives dedicated to encouraging Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander secondary students to complete their Year 12 education and consider pursuing higher studies at university.

The School of Indigenous Studies (SIS) Outreach Programs offer firsthand glimpses into university life. Through interactive sessions, meeting tertiary student role models, and discovering various courses, students navigated decisions about their academic future with guidance from university staff.

Balcatta had the privilege of sending seven students to attend both the Year 8 Discovery Day and the Year 9 Djinanginy Day.

#### **UN Youth Summit**

On Monday 11 September, students attended the UN Youth Summit at the Constitutional Centre of WA. The conference was run by UN Youth Australia, which had the purpose of increasing civic engagement in young people and raising awareness of global issues. The focus of the Summit was on the forthcoming referendum on the Voice to Parliament. During the session, they learnt about Australia's obligations under the UN Declaration of Rights for First Nation's People, the Uluru Statement of the Heart and the process of undertaking a referendum.



### **Skills West Career Expo**



They immersed themselves in diverse career experiences, from the Resources Technology Showcase in Term 1 with Mrs Anderson to the Year 9 Careers Conference at Joondalup, Automotive at Midland TAFE, Hair Styling at Balga TAFE, Exploring Hospitality and Tourism Careers in the City of Perth and The Perth Skills West Career and Employment Expo at the Convention Centre.

Most recently some students visited Balga TAFE for Plumbing and the Mt Lawley Campus for Health Care. The students completed their Course in Early Career Discovery which involved three sessions at school and a final session at the Northbridge TAFE campus participating in a mixture of career tasters. There will be two more excursions before the end of the year; the Civil Construction and Bricklaying & Carpentry Try-A-Trades three-day programs.

There have been numerous highlights throughout the year, from students ringing the bells at the Bell Tower to witnessing gold being poured at the Perth Mint. Some mastered braiding, crafted boom boxes from pipes, made personalised items such as key rings and tote bags, and some met Perth's Lord Mayor Basil Zempilas.

Nearly 90% of our Year 9 students took advantage of the chance to explore TAFE campuses and participate in the career tasters. Congratulations to each student for maintaining a high level of professionalism and actively participating in the sessions. Many lecturers commented they were among the best students they have had coming through their classrooms.

A sincere thank you to staff and teachers for their support throughout the year and to those who accompanied the students on these experiences.

We hope this year of early career discovery and experiences has been rewarding for all, assisting in making informed decisions about future subject choices at school and career paths. May curiosity about careers continue, leading students to meaningful experiences and practical insights into the world of work.

### **Recycling of food waste**

Our Education Support students have worked veryhard this year to collect food waste from the Cafeteria and Food Technologies Department and turn it into a very prosperous vegetable garden. We have diverted over 400kg of food waste from landfill in 2023.

What began as one tiny worm farm has expanded to four fully functioning healthy worm colonies - resources from donations. Our compost tumblers have been working overtime. Thanks to some generous donations, we have procured more to support the heavy demand. The garden has expanded with donated garden beds and soil, topped up with compost we made and aged over the recent holidays.

We sold all of our worm tea last term for a gold coin donation and used the money raised to maintain the food waste systems with compost conditioners and worm bedding.

The program was initially funded with a grant from the City of Stirling.

### **Waste Audit**

On Wednesday 11 October, students in the HASS Academic Extension class conducted a "waste audit" on the school grounds. The waste audit was led by the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation - Waste Sorted Schools Program.

The waste which was audited seemed to be primarily from the canteen or Food Technologies classroom, with not a huge amount of everyday student waste. We counted 80 snack wrappers and 16 Ziplock bags and pieces of plastic wrap. This accumulates to approximately 40,000 soft plastic items being sent to landfill each year. Unfortunately, there are currently no recycling options for these items, so avoidance is the best option. Some of the things you can do to try and reduce lunchbox waste is to promote the benefits of buying in bulk including receiving more of the snack, saving money, and reducing soft plastics to landfill.

### **Water Corporation**

Students in Year 7 Humanities and Social Sciences have been studying Geography this term. 


### **Year 11 Health Expo**

#### **Space Boot Camp**

During the July school holidays, Bipran Adhikari and Oliver Nowicki (Year 9) and Steven Le and Leena Meel (Year 10) attended the Space Boot Camp held over three days, from Wednesday 27 September to Friday 29 September. Students attended workshops such as Zero Gravity and Access to Space, Make Your Own Rocket with UWA Aerospace, Plants for Space workshop and Who Owns The Moon – Space Law and Conundrums. Panel discussions were held with industry experts from NASA, Woodside and Fugro SpAARC. This unique opportunity was sponsored by the Fogarty Foundation.

### The following account was written by Steven Le:

"At the Space Boot Camp we engaged in activities across all three days of the camp. Each day was filled with different activities and things to do, with free food provided on each day. The first day included building small bottle rockets, which we launched on the lawn, we did these in groups. Across the second day, we did numerous more things, with lots of speakers coming in to talk about their professions. We even had a time where we could ask people with experience (some having worked on satellites that are orbiting the moon) things of interest. The second day also included a trip to the Woodside Robotics Lab to visit NASA's Valkyrie Humanoid Robots, Spot and Valkyrie. The third day was the best as we got to go up north to the European Space Agency's West Australian Deep Space Network in New Norcia to look at the giant satellite dish stationed there This was used to communicate with different satellites, including one orbiting the sun. After this, we went to UWA's Zadko Observatory and Space Situational Awareness Node in Gingin where we had a quick review of the observatory and gravity discovery centre. Overall, it was quite fun, but it had quite a number of speakers coming in to talk about their experiences".

In the new groups, we researched previous solutions using Artificial Intelligence (AI). In the final challenge, we had 30 minutes to make a oneminute presentation with a prototype. I decided to try and fix the hospital environment for children. I made picture books that were career and fantasy-themed, and most importantly customisable. #### **National Science Week**

The theme for National Science Week 2023 was "Innovation: Powering Future Industries". With a wide range of events across our lower school classes, it was a great way for students to demonstrate their creativity and ingenuity. On Tuesday 15 August, Ms Dewi's Year 9 Academic Extension class led Year 5 students from four of our local intake primary schools through a range of activities to experience a variety of science experimentsd. The experiments taught students that science experiments can be attempted at home using simple ingredients. ### **Cultivating Futures Excursion**

On Monday 16 October, Mr Brigg's 10.2 Science class and Ms Dewi's 10.3 Science class attended the Cultivating Futures excursion. The purpose of this excursion was to improve students' awareness of the career options in agriculture. We were introduced to Jaime and Lilly from CQUniversity in Queensland who facilitated activities to discuss the agricultural challenge, sustainable development goals, skills and career pathways. They informed and introduced us to the different parts of the agriculture industry, including their own journeys, while contradicting common assumptions about the industry's unskilled rural and low paid jobs.

Students in Mr Brigg's class visited the CBH (Co-operative Bulk Handling) Group Metro Grain Centre and Faber Vineyard. At the grain centre, a manager took students on a tour inside offices and laboratories, informing students on procedures conducted and the variety of grains produced in Western Australia. Students visited onsite where they watched trucks unloading tonnes of harvest. Later at the winery, the owner took students on a leisurely walk across his crops of grapes. Students were taken on a tour inside their factory where hundreds of wines were created and packaged. The owner discussed the yearly process of harvesting, crushing, fermenting, pressing, stabilising and tasting the wine to quality standards made in the comfort of his own home.

Students in Ms Dewi's class visited the Department of Fisheries in Fremantle. Upon arriving, we were greeted by a scientist who guided the students around the research centre and explained what they did on a daily basis and the purpose of the research centre which is to grow a particular type of fish at a given time under a controlled environment to improve rate of success. The fish are then sent to different companies who sell them to members of the public. We also visited the Specialty Feeds in Glen Forrest where we were introduced to another scientist who took us around the factory where they make and package food for research and zoo animals. These foods are made for different purposes to suit the animals' needs. Overall, the excursion was a fun, insightful and educational experience.


