INTRODUCTION TO THE GUIDE




Applying to university can seem daunting, particularly if you're the first one in your family to try, but we're here to help you. No matter what your query is, we'll help you find the answer, and we'll offer advice on the best way forward.

This printed TISC Guide is targeted at current Year 12 school leavers. Universities also welcome applications from people with VET qualifications, tertiary qualifications, and work and life experience. There is extensive information on our website for anyone considering university study.

As you look through the Guide, you'll notice that each major section starts with a list of selected highlights to help you locate information that you will find particularly helpful.

The information in this Guide and on TISC's website is very important for your application. Go through it carefully before lodging your application, as TISC and the universities will assume you have read all relevant sections.

There are also some icons to identify:

-  actions you may need to take
-  things you need to be aware of
-  where you can get further information.

FEES AND CHARGES

APPLICATION PROCESSING FEE

There is a flat \$92.00 fee to apply through TISC for Semester 1, 2025 admission to WA universities.

This fee covers access to TISC services (for example, accessing your Year 11 and 12 school results and your ATAR) and processing of your application.

TISC won't activate your online application until you've paid for it.

You won't be able to see or use the other online options (like changing preferences) until your application is paid for.

You can pay the application processing fee in different ways:

- Online (Mastercard/Visa), either at the time of application or later by logging back in to your TISOnline account.

- By telephone (Mastercard/Visa), after completing the application declaration. TISC will need to speak to the cardholder, so if a parent is paying for your application, make sure they're with you when you phone. The cardholder can phone us to pay without the applicant present if they have the TISC ID and full name of the applicant.
- In person (cash, cheque, EFTPOS) by visiting our office in business hours (see inside cover of this Guide). The cardholder must be present if paying by card.
- By post (cheque, money order, or credit card via the authority form on your Application Coversheet). Do not send cash in the mail.

TISC doesn't refund fees except where required by law. Paying for an application is not a guarantee of a place.

HARD COPY RESULTS DOCUMENTS FOR 2024 WA YEAR 12 STUDENTS

You'll be able to access your Universities Admission Advice Letter (UAAL) (scaled scores and ATAR/ Selection Rank) for free via TISC's website until 1 March 2025, and you'll be able to print or save a PDF of your UAAL. We recommend that you print this for your records before 1 March, as there is a fee to retrieve a statement of results (ATAR certificate) after that date.

TISC will mail hard copy results on TISC stationery to you if you order and pay for this service. You can do this as part of your TISC application, or add it before results are released, by logging into your TISC account.

If you are not applying through TISC, you can still order these documents by logging in to the TISC website – all current-year WACE students are automatically registered with TISOnline.

These results may be ordered in the form of:

- The ATAR Certificate, which will list all your scaled scores including any achieved in previous years, your ATAR, and WACE achievement.
- The UAAL, which will list current-year scaled scores, as well as any past-year scaled scores used to calculate your ATAR, as well as information from each of the five universities about your eligibility and selection rank for that university. These messages relate to the current admission year only.

The cost to order these results is:
\$29.00 (first copy)
\$17.00 (extra copies in same order)

These fees apply to any combination of UAALs and ATAR Certificates in a single order.

APPLYING TO UNIVERSITY

✓ HOW DO I APPLY THROUGH TISC?

Apply via TISOnline, TISC's online application system at www.tisc.edu.au. You can apply whenever you like, but doing some preparation will help:

- Ensure you have your Unique Student Identifier (USI). Visit usi.gov.au to retrieve or create your USI. See page 6 for more information on the USI.
- Read the sections on pages 6-14, which tell you how the preference system works and how offers are made.
- Check the course descriptions and admission requirements of courses you're interested in on TISC's website. Note any prerequisites and specific requirements – if you are not studying the required subjects, you should check with the university before applying.
- Check pages 18-44 for Course Codes and other information which you'll need to apply.
- Read each university's section.
- Contact the universities to find out more about specific courses. The contact details of Western Australian universities are in the university sections of this Guide and on TISC's website.
- Check the important dates on page 2, and the calendar on TISC's website.

⚠ REMEMBER:

- Upload any documentation requested by your application coversheet (see page 14) to your TISC application. If you don't have this documentation yet – for example, a qualification that you expect to complete before the end of the year – make a note to yourself to upload it when you receive it.
- Note any extra course-related submissions you need to make (see page 14). These are specified in the relevant course information but are not requested by your application coversheet. TISC will email you to remind you of these submissions.
- Keep your Guide. You may want to refer to it between now and January.
- Check the TISC website regularly for new, amended, and withdrawn courses.
- Check your emails regularly (including your junk mail folder) in case TISC has contacted you about your application.
- Don't use your school email address when applying through TISC as you may not be able to access this email address once you've completed your Year 12 studies.

WHO SHOULD APPLY THROUGH TISC?

You can only apply through TISC if you're an Australian or New Zealand citizen, or you've been approved or granted Australian permanent resident status.

If you're applying for permanent residence, you aren't eligible to apply through TISC until your permanent residence status has been approved or granted. Contact the respective universities for advice.

NOTE: If you have a subclass 457 visa, you aren't eligible to apply through TISC. You must apply directly to the relevant university(ies).

You must provide correct details of your current residency status when you apply. If an offer is made to you, and university checks find that you've provided incorrect residency status information, the university concerned will withdraw your offer in accordance with its policies and procedures.

If you are eligible to apply for university through TISC, that does not mean you must apply through TISC. At the time of printing, the rules for 2024 WA Year 12 students (except international students) are:

- **Curtin University:** WA Year 12 students must apply through TISC.
- **Edith Cowan University:** WA Year 12 students must apply through TISC, unless you are applying for courses at the WA Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA), or for Summer UniPrep or UniPrep Accelerate.
- **Murdoch University:** WA Year 12 students must apply through TISC.
- **The University of Notre Dame Australia:** WA Year 12 students can apply directly for Notre Dame's Young Achievers Early Offer Program. Applicants who select an eligible Notre Dame degree as their first preference may also be considered for an early offer via TISC. Please note, the Bachelor of Biomedical Science (Assured Pathway to Medicine) is not eligible for early entry, and all applications for this degree must be made via TISC.
- **The University of Western Australia:** WA Year 12 students must apply through TISC, including Assured Pathways.

For information about direct application processes, contact the relevant university/ies.

APPLYING TO ASSOCIATE MEMBERS

Applications for courses offered by Associate Members are not lodged through TISC. Apply to the institution direct (contact details on inside back cover of this Guide and on TISC's website). You can have a TISC application as well as direct applications with Associate Members or other institutions.

The degrees and qualifications offered by TISC Associate Members are subject to the same quality standards and accreditation as the degrees and qualifications at universities. They may offer benefits such as smaller class sizes or additional pastoral care.

i RELEASE OF SCALED SCORES AND ATAR

You access only your scaled scores and ATAR from TISC's website – www.tisc.edu.au.

You access your WACE results, including details like raw examination marks, via the School Curriculum and Standards Authority website – www.scsa.wa.edu.au.

✓ APPLYING INTERSTATE

To apply to universities in other Australian states, apply through that state's Tertiary Admission Centre (organisations like TISC in each state). As it will be a separate application to your TISC application, with a separate list of course preferences, you may receive offers from more than one state.

Closing dates and fees vary, so it's important to check these on the websites listed below if you want to apply interstate.

The Commonwealth Government's Course Seeker website (www.courseseeker.edu.au) allows you to search and compare courses from across the country and may be useful if you are interested in studying interstate.

MY APPLICATION

i HOW DO I START MY APPLICATION?

You must be registered with TISOnline to be able to log in, lodge an application to university and access other online functions. Current WA Year 12s are registered automatically, unless you are studying the International Baccalaureate or at a non-standard school.

Your 8-digit TISC User ID is your 2024 WACE Candidate Number. To get started, go to the Registration Status Check page for information on the default password required for logging in to TISOnline for the first time. Once you log in for the first time, you will set your own password.

See the diagram on page 17 for a step-by-step guide to applying via TISOnline.

WHAT IF MY NAME OR DATE OF BIRTH IS INCORRECT?

TISC receives this information directly from the School Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA). If you notice that your name or date of birth is incorrect when you log in to TISOnline for the first time, you have two options.

1. Speak to your school and ask them to help you fix the error with SCSA. Once SCSA has corrected the information, allow a week for this to flow through to your TISOnline account before completing your application.
2. Continue with your TISC application. If you choose this option, you will then need to submit proof of the correct information (for example birth certificate) to TISC **as well as** to SCSA.

✓ ANSWERING THE QUESTIONS

The application process will ask you several questions, including contact details and demographic information. Many of these are for statistical purposes and won't affect the outcome of your application, but it's important to answer them accurately.

Unique Student Identifier

Your Unique Student Identifier (USI) is a 10-character alphanumeric identifier issued by the Federal Government. Many Year 12 students will already have one. To create one, or check what yours is, visit www.usi.gov.au

You will need to enter your USI to complete your TISC application. If you are unable to create one - usually only if you are a New Zealand citizen and not yet in Australia - contact TISC.

Contact Details

TISC will use email to contact you throughout the admissions cycle so check your emails regularly (including your junk mail), particularly leading up to the two all-preference offer rounds in December and January. Provide an email address which will be active throughout this period (ie NOT your school email address, which you may not be able to access after graduation). Save the email address which TISC will use to contact you (applications@tisc.edu.au) as an approved sender so that emails from TISC don't go to your junk mailbox.

TISC will assume that you've read email notifications and requests, so if there is a problem with the email address you supply, it may affect the outcome of your application. Plus, any offer of a place will be emailed to you, so a viable email address is essential.

Please also provide at least one telephone number in Australia which will be current from now until February. A mobile phone number is ideal, as TISC and the universities may send you a text message if the matter is urgent.

Your Studies and Qualifications

TISC has access to enrolments and results for all your General and ATAR subjects, including any you are sitting as a non-school-based candidate.

VET Qualifications

For standard entry, the universities only consider qualifications at Certificate IV level or higher, but you can list other VET qualifications if you wish.

If you want to be considered for Experience Based Entry pathways, or other non-ATAR entry pathways, it's a good idea to list any Certificate II or III qualifications as well.

Enabling Programs

If you are enrolled in a university enabling program through your school (for example, Curtin's UniReady, ECU's UniPrep, Murdoch's TLC Learning for Tomorrow/FlexiTrack High, or Notre Dame's UniPath), you must declare this under the university studies question.



We can't see if you are enrolled in VET qualifications or university enabling programs, even if these are done through your school. These must be declared by you on your application.

If they are not, you may miss out on an offer as TISC will not be aware you are studying this qualification/program.

CHOOSING AND CHANGING PREFERENCES

Choosing your Preferences

You can choose up to six courses.

List them in order of preference, starting with the course you'd most like to study. You should list more than one preference, especially if a similar course is offered at more than one university, or if your first preference is likely to be competitive (that is, more eligible applicants than there are places available). If you're not sure whether you meet the requirements for entry to a course, check with the relevant university's Future Students team.

It's a good idea to list preferences that have different Selection Rank or pre-requisite requirements, to give yourself the best chance of receiving an offer.

Start with your **dream course/s**. Even if you're not confident you'll achieve the requirements, aim high.

Then, add a couple of **confident choices**. Based on your Semester 1 exam results, you may have a reasonable idea of what approximate ATAR you're likely to achieve. Use the course codes and minimum/guaranteed selection ranks in this Guide (see page 18) to see what courses this may give you entry to.

Finally, it's a good idea to consider a **fallback choice** or two. Sometimes things don't go as you plan, and you can still find a path to your dream course – you just might need to consider a different route.

How does the Preference System Work?

In the TISC offer rounds, you will only receive one offer. Your first preference should be the course you'd most like to study, your second preference the course you'd next prefer to do, and so on up to six preferences. List only courses for which you'd accept an offer. You'll be made an offer for the preference highest on your list for which you're eligible, if a place is available.

Our system is designed to offer you the highest preference possible. If you're not selected for your first preference, you'll be considered equally with all other eligible applicants for your second preference, and so on. Your chance of being selected for a course isn't reduced because you've placed that course as a lower preference.

Changing Preferences

You can change your preferences online at any time, subject to closing dates. Check the dates on page 2 to see whether any course you want to add has an early closing date. Closing dates can't be extended. There's also a short closure period before the main round of offers when you can't change preferences.

You can change some of or all your preferences at once. Changing your preferences cancels all previous sets of preferences.

If you're applying for a course with an early closing date (see page 2), you must be very careful when changing your preferences. If you accidentally removed a closed course code from your preferences, you will not be able to add it again. If this happens to you, contact TISC immediately for advice.

You'll have a limited window of time after Year 12 results are released to change your preferences for the main offer round. We strongly recommend that you give serious thought to your preferences before then, to avoid making a rushed decision.

You can change your preferences between the two rounds of offers as long as you don't accept or defer your main round offer. Make sure that you understand the implications of changing preferences at this stage. Read the 'Offers' section on page 12.

How Do I Change Preferences?

Go to www.tisc.edu.au and log in to your account. If you forget your password, follow the prompts to change it – don't create a new application. Changing preferences is a three-step process, which involves moving through three pages online – make sure that you go through all three steps and receive a reference number, then you'll know you've successfully completed the change. It costs nothing to change your preferences.

Will TISC Confirm My Changes of Preference?

When you have finished changing your preferences online, you'll see a page confirming the changes you've made and providing a reference number, which you can print if you like. You can log in at any time to check your preferences, but make sure that you're viewing your current committed preferences, rather than those in your Course Folder or those which are still uncommitted.

Where Can I Get Advice?

If you don't understand the procedure involved, or if you're unsure whether to change preferences, contact TISC or the Admissions Centre at one of the universities before you do anything at all – in particular, before you accept or defer your offer.

METHOD OF ENTRY

Many courses offer experience-based entry. As part of choosing your preferences, you should consider whether you would like to be considered for experience-based entry. If your selected course code/s offer this entry pathway, you will see a check box next to this course code on your screen. Tick the check box if you wish to be considered for this entry pathway. This will then allow you to upload documents in the relevant category. If you meet the course requirements with your ATAR or equivalent selection rank, you will be made an offer based on that ATAR, and if you don't, the university can consider your experience-based entry application.

You can change the method of entry or study as part of the preference change process at any time, subject to closing dates.

Further information on experience-based entry is on page 10.

Courses offering experience-based entry are indicated in the course code lists on pages 18-44.

METHOD OF STUDY

Full-Time Studies

If you choose 'Full-time' as your method of study, you'll study a full-time load of units and enrol in classes on campus for whenever the unit is timetabled. This may be in the daytime or the evening. Some units may be offered in more than one timeslot. Full-time is indicated by 'F' in the lists on pages 18-44. Full-time university studies don't usually involve the same number of contact hours as secondary school, because you are expected to be responsible for study and preparation in your own time.

Part-Time Studies

You can study many courses part-time. Part-time means undertaking a lesser load of study than the normal full-time load. If you're a part-time student, you'll study a part-time load of units on campus. You'll enrol for classes on campus for whenever the unit is timetabled. This may be in the daytime or the evening. Some units may be offered in more than one timeslot. Courses available for part-time study are listed with method of study 'P' on pages 18-44.

External Studies

If you're an external (off-campus) student, you won't normally attend classes on campus. Course materials will be made available online, or possibly mailed to you. Some courses may be offered either partially or fully online. External study is available for some courses at Curtin University, Edith Cowan University and Murdoch University (method of study 'E' – see pages 18-44). The University of Notre Dame Australia and The University of Western Australia don't currently offer external study for undergraduate bachelor's degree programs.

Internet access is required for all external study at ECU.

Curtin Online Studies

Some Curtin courses are delivered either partially or fully online. If you're an external student, you won't attend classes on campus. Course materials are available online and you'll learn using a wide variety of sources that can include interactive videos and animations, simulations, online workgroups, etc. You're required to have internet access for Online Studies. Online Studies courses are listed on pages 19-26 and marked with superscript 7.

Can I Change My Method of Study After I Get an Offer?

You'll need to discuss this with the university when you enrol.

I'VE DONE MY APPLICATION – WHAT NOW?

- Make sure you read your coversheet. Your coversheet will tell you about any documentation that you need to upload in support of your application. There's lots of guidance on submitting documents on page 14.
- Check your email regularly. If there are additional submissions required, TISC will email you within three business days of your application.
- You'll be able to change your preferences and your contact details if necessary. Any other information can't be changed. If you have forgotten to add something or made an error, submit the changes in writing to TISC. You will find an Application Changes Form on TISC's website.

WILL TISC ACKNOWLEDGE MY APPLICATION?

Print or save your application coversheet as a record that you've applied, and as a reminder to upload the documents, if any, requested on it. Once you've applied, TISC will send you an email confirmation, so you'll know your application is live.

If you don't receive this email, log back in to your TISC account to check your application was correctly submitted.

WHAT'S MY TISC APPLICATION NUMBER?

Your TISC application number is recorded at the top of your application coversheet and is the same as your eight-digit WACE candidate number if you're a 2024 Year 12 student taking WACE courses or courses endorsed by the School Curriculum and Standards Authority. If you're a 2024 final year IB student, you must register as a new user on TISC's website before applying (see the IB brochure at www.tisc.edu.au for more information.)

If you're a 2024 final year student at a non-standard school in WA, you must register as a new user on TISC's website before applying (see Applicants for Admission from Non-Standard Schools on page 9).

Students enrolled in the Big Picture Program are considered to be at a non-standard school and should also follow these instructions.

UPDATING CONTACT DETAILS

Let TISC know if you change your address or your email address, because otherwise you may not receive important information about your application. See page 2 for the change of address/email address deadline before offers are made. Make sure you also ask your school to let the School Curriculum and Standards Authority know your new address.

FRAUDULENT APPLICATIONS

When you apply, you declare that your application is 'true and complete'. If your coversheet tells you to, you must upload documentary proof of all previous Year 12 (or equivalent), and post-secondary studies, including failed courses or units. It's a serious offence to submit a false declaration or false documents. If you do, TISC will notify all participating universities, and your application may be withdrawn. Some universities have policies in place which will prevent you being offered a place in subsequent years. Past cases have also been referred to the police. If you're offered a place in a course and your application is later found to have been incomplete or misleading, your enrolment can be terminated, and your academic record annotated accordingly.

We understand that sometimes applicants accidentally leave out information or make a mistake – if this happens to you, just contact TISC as soon as you realise, and we can make sure this information is corrected or added to your application.

UNDERGRADUATE ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

All the universities require you to demonstrate a certain level of competence in English. This is so that you will have a high chance of succeeding in the course you choose. Not meeting the English Language requirements doesn't mean you can't attend university, but you may need to complete some further study first to improve your chances of success.

For WA Year 12 students, the recommended path is by attempting ATAR English, ATAR Literature, or ATAR English as an Additional Language/Dialect. If you achieve a scaled score of 50 or higher in one of these subjects, you will satisfy the English Language requirements for all five WA universities.

If you don't achieve a scaled score of 50 or higher in an ATAR English subject, here are some other ways you may be able to satisfy the English Language requirements for direct entry into undergraduate degrees as a Year 12 WACE student:

MURDOCH	Complete Year 11 and 12 in Australia.
NOTRE DAME	Complete Year 11 and 12 in Australia. For more information, refer to notredame.edu.au/study/applications-and-admissions/admission-requirements/english-language-requirements
UWA	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Complete UWA's communication bridging unit in your first semester. Check with UWA for details; OR Sit STAT (both sections) in December/January – UWA conditional offer letter required; OR Complete a UWA-approved English test.

This list is not exhaustive, and you should check with the university where you are applying for more information. Some courses may have higher English requirements. Enabling courses, experience-based entry pathways and portfolio entry pathways may have differing requirements.

APPLICANTS FOR ADMISSION FROM NON-STANDARD SCHOOLS

Non-standard schools in Western Australia include schools like Perth Waldorf School that don't deliver WACE, or schools following the Big Picture Program. It also includes homeschooled students.

Apply for admission via TISC, but also include with your application a statement giving full details of your upper secondary school studies.

WACE isn't required by any of the universities for applicants from non-standard schools, but an equivalent senior secondary certificate may be required. You should check with the university/ies if you are unsure.

SPECIAL TERTIARY ADMISSIONS TEST

STAT is a nationally recognised set of tests offered by TISC to help mature-aged candidates gain entry to university. STAT doesn't test knowledge of specific academic subjects but tests a range of competencies considered important for success in university study, such as the ability to understand and think critically about issues. As a result, you don't need any particular preparation to sit STAT.

STAT is also used by the Western Australian universities as a second-chance test of English competence. If you don't achieve English Language Competency via your WACE exam but have sat the exams in English ATAR, Literature ATAR or English as an Additional Language or Dialect ATAR, you may be invited to sit STAT in late December/early January to demonstrate English Language Competency for university entrance. This invitation will be on your Universities Admission Advice Letter (UAAL), which will also provide your ATAR and scaled scores from ATAR courses. If your UAAL doesn't invite you to sit STAT at Year 12 results time, but you've sat exams in one of the above English courses, you may also sit STAT to achieve English Language Competency. In this case, it would be wise to check with the universities whether English Language Competency is all that is required to give you eligibility for university entry. See TISC's website for information on STAT and how to book a test but note that you can't book until after the WACE examinations.

If you took English/Literature/English as an Additional Language or Dialect General, you may need special permission from a university before you can book for STAT. The universities have different policies in this area, so if you took one of these General English subjects, it's best to check with the university/ies before booking for STAT, otherwise your booking form may be rejected, which can cause delays. You also will not be able to book until after the WACE examinations, even if you are not sitting any of the examinations.

Generally, Year 12 school leavers are not permitted to sit the Multiple Choice section of STAT. Some limited exemptions may apply, but applicants must request permission from the university/ies where they wish to study.

There is a fee to sit STAT:

- \$195.00 to sit one section (eg, Written English only)
- \$295.00 to sit both sections.

EDUCATIONAL ACCESS SCHEME

If you've faced circumstances beyond your control that have adversely affected your study during Years 11 and 12, you can submit a single application through TISC's **Educational Access Scheme** (EAS) to be considered by each university in your preference list.

Your EAS application will be handled in the strictest confidence by TISC and the universities concerned.

EAS covers the following areas of possible disadvantage:

- School environment – for example, multiple relocations during your schooling, attending a school where few students are interested in university study or a school in a rural or isolated area.
- Financial circumstances – for example, family financial hardship,
- Low socio-economic status background or needing to work excessive hours to support family income.
- Family situation – for example, family disruption, death of a close family member or friend, lack of a supportive home study environment, supporting family member/s with illness/disability, or Indigenous background.
- Personal health issues – for example, personal medical condition/disability, or accidental injury.
- Other circumstances – for example, difficult migrant passage, refugee/asylum seeker status, leaving foster care, or any other circumstances not covered above.

Generally, the EAS will not override English competency or pre-requisite requirements, and is not designed for students on a non-ATAR pathway. If you are on a non-ATAR pathway, don't meet English competency, or don't complete the required pre-requisite subject/s, you should check with the university where you want to study as to which entry pathway is most appropriate for you (also see *Pathways to University* below).

Supporting documentation will be required, and the closing date to be considered for the main round is 29 November, to allow the assessment panel time to assess the documentation. If you think you may wish to apply for EAS, we recommend that you organise your application well in advance, as statements of support can take time to obtain. Check the details on the TISC website or email eas@tisc.edu.au for advice.

PATHWAYS TO UNIVERSITY

While many Year 12s will be selected for university admission based on their ATAR, there are a variety of different pathways to university.

Experience-based entry

Experience-based entry is a selection method used by universities (or other higher education providers) to assess students whose formal education qualifications alone may not be enough to gain admission to a course, but who can demonstrate other relevant work and life skills and experience that make them a suitable candidate.

For school leavers, examples of experience-based entry pathways might include:

- Getting an ATAR that's lower than the required minimum, and demonstrating additional knowledge and skills via a Certificate II, paid work, and music/arts performance.
- Completing fewer than four ATAR subjects and demonstrating additional knowledge and skills via a Certificate III, school leadership roles, or a portfolio of visual artwork.
- Completing a Certificate IV and meeting a university's English Language competence requirement.

Please note that these are examples only and each university sets their own requirements for experience-based entry pathways. See the information below for more information on experience-based entry pathways that may be available for school leavers.

Curtin: If you're applying for the Portfolio Entry pathway, apply through TISC. You can attach your portfolio documents to your TISC application under the "Experience Based Entry" document category or submit them directly to Curtin. For more information regarding Portfolio Entry Pathway, please refer to curtin.edu/portfolio-entry.

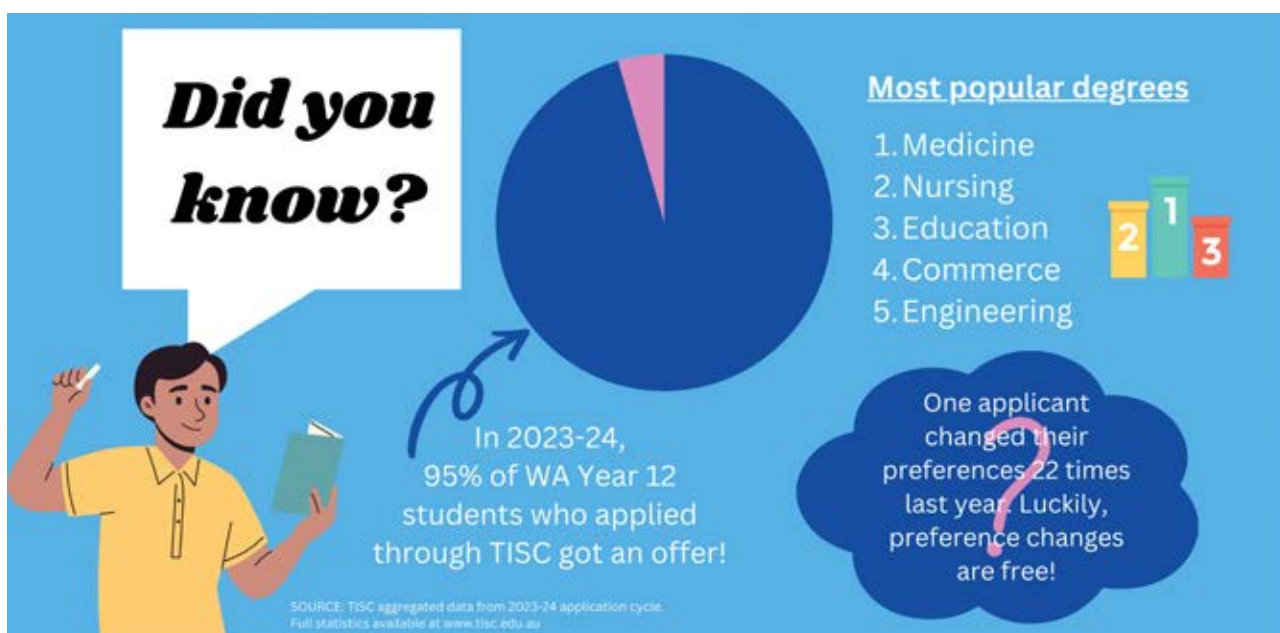
ECU: If you're a school leaver and eligible to be considered through the Experience Based Entry Scheme you must apply through TISC and upload your supporting documents to your TISC application. If you're submitting an Experience Based Entry Scheme application for a WAAPA course or the Bachelor of Education (Secondary) – Music Education, you must apply and upload your supporting documents directly to ECU.

Murdoch: If you're an Experience Based Entry applicant, apply through TISC and attach your supporting documents to your TISC application under the "Experience Based Entry" document category. Information on the courses available and entry requirements for the Murdoch University Experience Based Entry and Media Portfolio Entry is available at <https://www.murdoch.edu.au/study/pathways-to-uni/enabling-pathways/experience-based-entry>

The University of Notre Dame Australia: If you are applying for Experience Based Entry, you should apply directly to Notre Dame.

The University of Western Australia: If you're applying for Experience Based Entry as a Year 12 school leaver, you must apply through TISC, and you can submit supporting documents as part of your TISC application. All other applicants can apply directly to UWA.





TAFE and other Vocational Education and Training (VET) study

VET qualifications may be used as part of an experience-based entry pathway, or qualifications at Certificate IV, Diploma or Advanced Diploma level may be used to meet the academic entry requirements to many university degrees.

You may be completing a VET qualification as part of your secondary studies, but you can also go on to study at TAFE, or a private Registered Training Organisation (RTO), as part of your post-school pathway to university.

Before selecting a VET course, you should check if the TAFE college or RTO has articulation arrangements with the university where you wish to study. This can help simplify your pathway and ensure you get credit for prior learning where appropriate. If there is no formal articulation arrangement in place, it's a good idea to discuss your potential pathway with the university.

TAFE Western Australia has five colleges:

- North Metropolitan TAFE
- South Metropolitan TAFE
- Central Regional TAFE
- North Regional TAFE
- South Regional TAFE

University enabling programs

Universities offer a range of enabling programs, which are **non-award courses** (that is, they don't lead to a degree or other qualification) that aim to prepare students for undergraduate study.

In some cases, these may be delivered as part of your Year 12 studies, but more commonly they are studied after finishing secondary school – in some cases, many years later!

You can apply for the following enabling programs through TISC:

- Curtin's UniReady
- ECU's UniPrep (Standard)
- Murdoch's OnTrack Flex and OnTrack Sprint
- Notre Dame's Tertiary Pathway Program and Tertiary Pathway Program - Nursing
- UWA's Aboriginal Orientation Program

See Course Codes on pages 18-44 for more details.

Most of the universities also offer additional enabling programs that may be tailored to students from certain backgrounds or with particular undergraduate programs in mind. See the university information on pages 45-68 for more information.



CASE STUDY

Harriet wants to be a registered nurse. In Year 12, she completed a General/VET pathway and achieved her WACE along with a Certificate II in Community Services.

Harriet used her Year 12 results, including her Certificate II, to apply for a Certificate IV in Preparation for Health and Nursing Studies at TAFE.

After completing her Certificate IV, she successfully applied for the Diploma of Nursing.

When she completed this course, she was able to register and work as an Enrolled Nurse.

Harriet is now applying for a Bachelor of Nursing, using her Diploma to meet entry requirements*. Taking the TAFE pathway has meant she can work part-time as an enrolled nurse while pursuing her career goal of becoming a registered nurse.

OFFERS

WHO MAKES THE OFFERS?

The individual universities make the offers of admission. After any of the offer rounds, if you have any queries about why you have or haven't been made an offer, contact the Admissions Centre of the university concerned.

HOW ARE THE OFFERS MADE?

Your application is considered based on selection criteria established by each university. You're ranked in order of merit for each course you've listed. Most universities consider any or all of the following when considering your application:

- secondary studies; and
- other studies done while at school, such as enabling programs or VET qualifications; and
- post-secondary studies; and
- in some cases, special circumstances.

The offer process will consider your first preference first, and if it's possible to offer you that, will do so. If it's not possible to offer you your highest preference, the system will ignore that preference and try to offer you your next preference. This process continues until we can make you an offer, or until all your preferences have been considered. If an offer is made, any preference lower than the offered preference is ignored. You can view your offer via TISC's website. The university concerned will advise you of the offer details by email, including information on how to respond to the offer.

WHAT IS A SELECTION RANK?

For most courses, you'll be selected for admission based on your ATAR (for IB students, a conversion from your International Baccalaureate Admissions Score to a Combined Rank). However, some universities assign WACE students who are eligible for certain Adjustment Factors a Selection Rank which is higher than their ATAR. For these students, selection into courses is based on the Selection Rank assigned by the university concerned.

Eligibility for the adjustment factors is based on specified criteria. International WACE students are not eligible for these adjustment factors. TISC advises eligible WACE students at the time of the WACE results/ATAR release in December, via the Universities Admission Advice Letter (UAAL). The appropriate Selection Rank is automatically applied for offer rounds. For 2025 admission, the following pathways provide Selection Ranks for eligible WACE students: Curtin University's StepUp to Curtin Pathway, ECU's ECU Access Pathway, Murdoch University's RISE Pathway, and The University of Western Australia's Broadway UWA program. For further details about any of these pathways, see the individual universities' sections in this Guide or the university's website.

Notre Dame will assign Selection Ranks based on additional criteria (Individual Factors). These Selection Ranks may not be reflected on your UAAL. If you are applying for Notre Dame, you should submit an Individual Factors form to provide information about yourself. TISC will email you reminding you to submit this form if you list any Notre Dame course preferences.

For 2024 WACE students, your Selection Rank for each of the TISC participating universities will be printed on your Universities Admission Advice Letter, as well as your raw ATAR.

WHEN WILL I GET MY OFFER?

The five universities are making early offers to Year 12 students for some courses. See the next section for details. Separately from early offers, there will be two rounds of TISC offers as in previous years.

Main round offers will be available to view on the TISC website on Saturday 21 December. Emailed details of an offer will be sent by the universities over the following few business days.

Second round offers will be available to view on the TISC website on Tuesday 21 January with email details sent out by the universities shortly afterwards.

Second round offers will be made to eligible new applicants, previously unoffered applicants who are now eligible (including those who sat STAT to satisfy university English requirements), those who changed preferences since the previous round, and those applying for some quota courses where some places were held for the second round.

EARLY OFFERS FOR YEAR 12 STUDENTS

All WA universities are participating in early offers to Year 12 students for selected courses. In most cases, courses with limited places will not make early offers, and neither will enabling programs. Details of the early offer schemes vary by university, so you should check with each university for further details. Early offers will not be made until Monday 2 September 2024, as recommended by the Federal Government's Universities Accord Final Report in February 2024.

For Curtin, ECU, Murdoch and UWA, your TISC application is your early offer application, subject to closing dates. If your first TISC preference is eligible for an early offer, the application will be assessed. These four universities will make early offers on the following dates:

- Monday 2 September 2024
- Tuesday 24 September 2024
- Monday 14 October 2024
- Monday 18 November 2024
- Monday 2 December 2024

Notre Dame's early offer program is by direct application. If you apply through TISC with Notre Dame as your first preference, Notre Dame will be in touch. Notre Dame will make early offers on a progressive basis from Monday 2 September 2024 through until Wednesday 11 December 2024.

If you receive an early offer, you should check carefully whether it has conditions that you must fulfil, such as achieving a certain ATAR, or passing particular subjects.

Receiving or accepting an early offer does not lock you in, and you can still add, remove, or change preferences on your TISC application, subject to closing dates.

Not receiving an early offer does not mean you will not receive an offer in the TISC all-preference offer rounds.

HOW MANY OFFERS WILL I GET?

Generally, only one offer, if any, in each of the offer rounds. If you receive an offer in each of the TISC all-preference offer rounds, the later one supersedes the earlier one. You can't have both.

If you change preferences during the early offer period, you may receive more than one early offer, however again, the formal TISC offer will supersede this.

I'VE GOT A MAIN ROUND OFFER! WHAT DO I DO NEXT?

Congratulations! Check the options below, or the diagram on the TISC website, for what to do next.

You've been made an offer you're happy with and you're ready to start!

Accept the offer, following the university's instructions in your offer email. There'll be a deadline in your offer email, so make sure you accept in time. You won't be made any other offers.

You've been made an offer you're happy with, but you'd like to take a break before you start.

Apply to defer your place. There'll be information about what is possible and a deadline in your offer email, so make sure you act in time.

Remember, a deferral is an acceptance of the offer, so you won't be made any further offers.

You've been made an offer and you're not quite sure now whether that's what you really want.

If you're offered your first preference:

Use the TISC 'automatic safety net'. Don't accept your offer now (remember, a deferral counts as an acceptance). Move your first preference offer to a lower position on your preference list and try for an offer in a higher preference in the next round. You don't need to contact the university. This change of preferences saves your offer. When the next round of offers is made, you'll either get an offer for a higher preference course or your saved main round offer again. A new offer cancels the previous offer – you can't hold two offers at the same time. You won't get an offer for a preference listed lower than your saved offer.

If you're offered your second, third, fourth, fifth or sixth preference:

Use the TISC 'automatic safety net'. Don't accept or defer your offer now. You can either:

- Do nothing at all and hope to get a higher preference offer in the next round; or
- Move the offered course to a lower position on your preference list and try for an offer in a higher preference. You don't need to contact the university.

Either way, your offer is saved and, when the next round of offers is made, you'll either get an offer for a higher preference course or a new offer for your saved course. A new offer cancels the previous round's offer – you can't hold two offers at the same time. You won't get an offer for a preference listed lower than your saved offer.

The offer you receive in the second round will have a new acceptance deadline, so don't worry about 'missing' the deadline in your main round offer email. As long as you follow the instructions above, your offer will be saved.

You've been made an offer, but you've totally changed your mind about what you want to do.

To reject the offer, change your preferences and remove the offered preference from your preference list. You'll lose the offer, but you'll be reconsidered in the next round. Most courses will continue to take students who meet the minimum entry requirements.

If you've been offered your first preference and you don't do anything, the offer may lapse. This might mean you lose your guaranteed place.

Contact TISC if you make errors in changing your preferences between offer rounds or are unsure about what to do. We can help you.

I DIDN'T GET A MAIN ROUND OFFER – WHAT ARE MY OPTIONS?

If you didn't receive an offer, don't panic. Here are your options:



Do nothing and automatically be considered for the second round. Be careful before choosing to do this, as in most cases, whatever stopped you from getting an offer in the main round will stop you from getting an offer in the second round, if nothing changes.



Change your preferences to courses that you do meet the requirements for, and automatically be considered for the second round.



Fix any problems and automatically be considered for the second round. For example, if you hadn't satisfied the English Language Competency requirement, you may satisfy this by sitting STAT (see page 9) and achieving the required score.



If you don't know why you didn't receive an offer, it's important that you seek advice from TISC and/or the university Admission Centre/s. It's much easier for us to help you if you contact us as soon as you find out you were unsuccessful in main round. If you wait until after the second round, it's more difficult.

Let TISC know if you no longer wish to be considered for any course at any university and we'll withdraw your application.

SECOND ROUND OFFERS

You'll be considered in the second round of offers, and may be made an offer if you:

- Hadn't satisfied entry requirements (eg English competency) in time for the main round, but have since met the requirements; or
- Are completing a qualification where final results were not available in time to be considered in the main round; or
- Changed your preferences between the offer rounds, subject to closing dates; or
- Received an offer in the main round and elected to save that offer (automatic safety net); or
- Applied too late to be considered in the main round; or
- Didn't receive an offer in the main round and didn't advise TISC to withdraw your application.

You'll either be:

- Made an offer if you have met course entry requirements since the main round; or
- Offered a preference higher than your saved offer; or
- Re-offered your saved offer; or
- Made an offer, even if unsuccessful in the main round of offers; or
- Advised that your application was unsuccessful.

⚠ I'VE BEEN MADE A SECOND ROUND OFFER. WHAT DO I DO NOW?

Accept your offer by enrolling or deferring by the deadline in your offer email or you'll lose your offer. There aren't any further TISC offer rounds.

ENROLMENTS AND DEFERRALS

How do I enrol?

Your offer email will outline enrolment procedures. You'll have to enrol online or in person. Note that you will need a Tax File Number (TFN) and a USI to apply for a HECS-HELP loan.

Enrolments for Curtin University, Edith Cowan University and Murdoch University must be done online. UWA enrolments can be done online or at an in-person drop-in session.

Can I defer?

You can defer most courses. The university will advise you if the course you are offered cannot be deferred. Deferral is usually for twelve months. For some courses, the universities also allow deferral for one semester if second semester entry is available for the course and there are places available. For further information, check with the universities.

Remember, deferring your place counts as an **acceptance** of your offer and you will not be considered in further offer rounds.

WHAT IF I'LL BE AWAY FROM HOME IN DECEMBER-FEBRUARY?

You should ensure that you are able to check your email at regular intervals during the offer and enrolment period (December 2024 to February 2025). If you do not accept your offer or complete your enrolment by the university's set deadline, you may lose your place.

If you want TISC or the universities to be able to discuss your application, offer or enrolment with someone other than you, you must provide written authority. Download the online authorisation form (printing three copies), fill in each form and send one to TISC. Give one form to the person you've nominated so they can present it if they need to contact TISC or the universities and keep the remaining completed form for yourself.

WHAT ELSE DO I NEED TO KNOW?

SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION

TISC needs documentary proof of all qualifications and any change of name you've stated on your application. TISC can obtain some of this proof electronically, but not all of it. If you need to provide any documentation, your Application Coversheet will tell you. If TISC isn't successful in retrieving the results it expects for you, we'll email you and ask you to provide the documentary proof yourself.

Applications where information or documentation isn't complete may not be successful. It's your responsibility to provide all supporting documents that TISC requests from you.

Current (Semester 2 2024) studies

You do not need to upload any documents relating to your Year 12 ATAR and/or General courses, unless you are specifically asked to.

If you're studying anything else in 2024 – for example, a Certificate IV through your school – and haven't yet completed your course, apply to TISC by the closing date and upload all documents requested by your Application Coversheet, except those related to your current study.

Upload the documents for your Semester 2, 2024 study as soon as they're available. TISC and the universities can't guarantee that documents received at TISC after the published closing date for receipt of documents will be considered in the main round of offers, but they'll be considered for the second offer round.

Additional documentation

Sometimes TISC may request that you submit documentation that isn't requested on your coversheet. This is usually because it relates to a specific course preference that you have listed. For example, nursing, teaching, medicine and veterinary medicine courses often require additional submissions.

These are listed on the TISC website, and you will receive an email from TISC outlining what you need to do, within three business days of your initial application or preference change.

Documentation which TISC will try to obtain for you

WA TAFE and Fremantle Education Centre studies

TISC can obtain Semester 2, 2024 results for all WA TAFEs and Fremantle Education Centre, provided you apply to TISC by 30 November 2024. WA TAFEs will only provide proof of course completion to TISC if you've applied to graduate. You must apply to your WA TAFE for your award by the end of October 2024 if you expect to complete your qualification at the end of 2024. If you don't do this, it may affect your application, as the universities require proof of course completion when assessing your qualifications.

You may prefer to upload your certificate yourself, which you can do at any time.

International Baccalaureate results

TISC can retrieve 2024 International Baccalaureate results if candidates release them. If you're sitting The Diploma of the International Baccalaureate (IB) in 2024, arrange through your school in advance for your results to be made available to TISC. Provide your IB personal code so that TISC can retrieve your results.

Results from university enabling programs

If you are currently enrolled in a university enabling program, TISC will be able to obtain these results for you as long as you correctly declare it on your application.

If you are enrolled in Murdoch's FlexiTrack High and are applying for courses at other universities, you may need to provide a letter confirming completion of the program.

Uploading documents

If you need to upload documents, you must comply with TISC's requirements for supporting documentation:

- Documents must be original, uncertified documents which are complete, in colour and clearly legible (not blurred). Copies, certified copies, online printouts, faxes, and examination result slips aren't accepted for upload.
- For Certificate IV or lower qualifications, in most cases you will only need to upload the award (completion) certificate.
- For Diploma or higher qualifications, you need to upload the award (completion) certificate and a separate statement of academic record listing the units or competencies completed within the qualification.

Note: In all cases TISC reserves the right to request an original document.

When you are uploading documents, you may have different categories to choose from.

- Qualifications that you have listed may have their own category. For example if you declare a Certificate IV in Business at a private training provider, you will see this as a category. This is where you should upload proof of completion and any other documents relating to this qualification.

- Experience-based entry documents. If you have listed at least one preference that accepts experience-based entry applications, you will see this as a category. This is where you should upload experience-based entry documents required by the university/ies.
- EAS documents. If you have applied for consideration under the Educational Access Scheme (see page 10), you will see this as a category. This is where you should upload documents required for the EAS, such as your applicant statement. These documents have restricted access due to their potentially sensitive nature.
- General documents. This is where you should upload any other documents, for example a completed English Declaration for nursing courses.

Documentation you should not submit

To reduce the amount of information held by TISC, please don't submit:

- Identification documents (birth certificate, driver's license), unless specifically required for a change of name or personal details.
- Participation certificates and other similar documents, unless these form part of an experience-based entry or EAS application.
- School reports, unless these form part of a experience-based or EAS application or you have been specifically asked to submit them. The universities will calculate your predicted ATAR, if applicable, from your final Year 11 results that are received from SCSSA.
- Your final Year 12 report or Statement of Results. We will obtain this information from SCSSA.

AUSTRALIAN YEAR 12 RESULTS COMPARISON

An ATAR achieved from 2011 or later in any state or territory (2020 or later in Queensland) is considered the same as an ATAR from any other state or territory.

Tertiary institutions throughout Australia agree that if an interstate Year 12 applicant has fulfilled the requirements for eligibility for selection into all courses in their home state, they are eligible for consideration for entry into courses in another state (subject to ATAR and any specific course requirements).

AUDITIONS AND INTERVIEWS

ECU: For WAAPA courses and the Bachelor of Education (Secondary) - Music Education major only - you must apply directly to ECU (ecu.edu.au/apply). Audition requirements will apply, check with ECU for details.

UWA: Auditions are required for:

- Bachelor of Music, Music (Extended Major)
- Music General Studies major
- Music Studies major
- Contemporary Popular Music major

You need to apply through TISC and submit a separate application for audition/interview direct to UWA. More details are in the course information on TISC's website.

Interviews for **Medicine** courses at **Curtin**, **Notre Dame** and **UWA**, for **Dentistry** and **Podiatric Medicine** courses at **UWA**, and for **Veterinary Medicine** at **Murdoch** will be arranged by the respective Schools based on factors including your predicted ATAR (not used by UWA), and your UCAT score (Medicine and Dentistry) and/or Casper score (Murdoch Veterinary Medicine and Curtin Medicine). COURSE CODES – SOME TIPS

- Use the codes in this section to apply for courses and change preferences. You can also find the codes – and important course information – using the Course Search function on the TISC website.
- Read the course information on our website, so you get the full picture on entry requirements for your chosen courses.
- Majors (specialisations) within degrees might have a specific course code or might be listed with other majors under the name of the degree. If they're listed under the name of the degree without a separate course code, you'll be able to choose which major you want to do when you enrol at the university.
- In some courses, you can choose to complete two majors (double major). Popular combinations may be listed in the following pages, but there are many more combinations available. It pays to check with the university before you apply if you're interested in a particular major combination, as not all majors can be combined. To apply for a double major, just choose the code that includes one of the majors you're interested in. You can confirm the combination once you enrol.
- You only need to use a course code once in your preference list. Our application system won't let you add it twice. This is so you can keep the biggest range of options available.
- Check codes carefully, as some courses are offered at more than one campus, or offer different entry pathways with separate codes.
- Some courses have specific subject prerequisites. Check the entry on TISC's Course Search for details.
- All courses lead to a Bachelor degree, except where indicated.

GUARANTEED AND MINIMUM ATAR/ SELECTION RANKS

Minimum ATARs/Selection Ranks are provided for most courses. Minimum ATARs/Selection Ranks show you the rank needed to be considered for entry to a course. However, obtaining these ranks is not a guarantee of being selected for a place in these courses. Some courses will have N/A for the minimum ATAR/ Selection Rank, where an ATAR is not applicable due to emphasis on other eligibility criteria.

Remember, the Selection Rank may include adjustment factors (see page 12). Your selection rank may be higher than your ATAR, or it may be equal to your ATAR.

Guaranteed ATARs/Selection Ranks are listed for many courses. If you achieve the Guaranteed ATAR/Selection Rank for a course, you are guaranteed acceptance into that course, provided you also achieve WACE*, English Competency, and a scaled score of 50 or more in any ATAR course prerequisites listed for the course.

Some courses have no Guaranteed ATAR/Selection Rank listed, as they use additional selection criteria (such as aptitude test, audition, interview, etc) and/or have limited places available.

For most courses, information on the lowest, highest, and median (middle) ATARs and Selection Ranks offered places in the previous year is available on TISC's Course Search, university websites or the CourseSeeker website. If this is not available, it may be because it is a new course, or because students were admitted on a basis other than ATAR.

ADMISSION CRITERIA

GENERAL ADMISSION CRITERIA

- An Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) of 70 or equivalent; and
- English Language proficiency (refer to curtin.edu/english-criteria for details)
- Current Year 12 applicants also need to meet WACE requirements. Please check the *Admission Requirements for School Leavers 2025* brochure on the TISC website for more information.

COURSE SPECIFIC CRITERIA

- Some courses require an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) above 70;
- Any course prerequisites and other essential requirements for a particular course (refer to course page).

Applicants with a completed AQF Certificate IV qualification, along with evidence of satisfying Curtin University's English language proficiency requirements, will meet the general admission criteria.

There are a number of ways you can satisfy admission criteria. The University reserves the right to determine the appropriate equivalence. Although you may be eligible for admission to the University, this doesn't guarantee a place, particularly in courses for which there's competition for the number of places available.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY

You must satisfy the University's English language proficiency for admission to Curtin University. You can demonstrate English language proficiency by achieving a scaled score of at least 50 or a final Year 12 school grade of C or higher in one of the following WACE courses: English ATAR, Literature ATAR or English as an Additional Language/ Dialect (EALD) ATAR (for eligible students). A final Year 12 school grade of A in General English or Literature will also meet this requirement

Some courses have specific English requirements. Visit curtin.edu/higher-English for details.

ADMISSION PATHWAYS

Curtin offers bridging programs to selected students who don't satisfy admission criteria for chosen courses. Check your eligibility for these courses, and make sure the course will allow you to continue into the undergraduate degree of your choice.

UNIREADY ENABLING PROGRAM

The UniReady Enabling Program aims to develop independent learning skills in preparation for university-level study. It's a bridging course that helps you meet Curtin's minimum admission requirements for a range of health*, humanities, business, science and engineering* courses.

*Not direct access to all courses. Please visit curtin.edu/uniready for details. Applicants may be required to complete extra documentation. You must be over the compulsory school age as defined by the Western Australian School Education Act 1999 in the year you want to study in the UniReady Enabling Program.

Indigenous Tertiary Enabling Course (ITEC)

The Centre for Aboriginal Studies offers the ITEC, which is an enabling course designed to bridge Indigenous students into undergraduate degree programs. The broad aims of the course are to develop the knowledge and competencies required by Indigenous people to access and complete undergraduate degree programs.

Indigenous Pre-Medicine and Health Science Enabling Course

The Indigenous Pre-Medicine and Health Sciences Enabling Course is designed to provide an alternate pre-entry pathway for Indigenous students into undergraduate courses within the Faculty of Health Sciences including Medicine. The course aims to give students the skills and confidence to pursue higher education in the fields of medicine and health sciences in a culturally appropriate environment.

Indigenous Pre-Science and Engineering Enabling Course

The Indigenous Pre-Science and Engineering Enabling Course is designed to provide Indigenous Australian students the fundamentals of education in the science and engineering field with an introduction to science (STEM) subject areas. Successful completion of this course with an ATAR Equivalence entry score and career pathway counselling, will provide a strong foundation for students to articulate into Multidisciplinary Science or another nominated undergraduate degree in the Faculty of Science and Engineering.



PORTFOLIO OR EXPERIENCE-BASED ENTRY INTO SELECTED COURSES

Alternative entry is available for selected courses for those who can demonstrate equivalence to Curtin's ATAR entry through the submission of a portfolio and/or the demonstration of work/life experience. Applicants are required to provide a complete portfolio when applying through TISC. An interview may be required as part of the application process.

If you are a school leaver, please prepare your supporting documentation before the end of the school year to ensure you have the required documents, as letters of support can be harder to obtain after the school year has concluded.

SPECIAL CONSIDERATION

Curtin recognises that preparation for tertiary study isn't always smooth. Special consideration is a scheme for applicants whose educational achievements have been compromised or disadvantaged by external factors. Applicants applying for this scheme will have these factors considered as part of their application.

STEPUP TO CURTIN

StepUp to Curtin is one of many equity initiatives at Curtin that work towards breaking down the barriers to higher education.

Not everyone has the same opportunities to achieve their true academic potential. You may have the ability to succeed at university but not had the educational, financial or social opportunities to focus on your studies and achieve a high enough Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) for entry. That's where StepUp can help.

StepUp to Curtin is a collaboration of two alternative access schemes: StepUp Entry and StepUp Equity Adjustment Admission Pathway (StepUp Bonus). Both schemes are for domestic applicants who are applying to Curtin University based on their ATAR from Australian Year 12 and grant an adjustment factor of additional ATAR points making applicants eligible to be considered for admission into Curtin undergraduate courses.

Successful StepUp Entry and StepUp Equity Adjustment Admission Pathway (StepUp Bonus) applicants will be eligible to be considered for admission into courses at Curtin University, in courses with no prerequisites or where prerequisites have been met.

DEFERRING YOUR STUDIES

If you have received a TISC offer, you can defer your offer for a period of twelve months. If the course you wish to defer has a mid-year intake and availability for students to return after six months, you will receive an email from Curtin University by May regarding your deferred place. Otherwise, you will be contacted by September. A place of study in the same course will only be guaranteed for the following 12 months.

EXTERNAL AND ONLINE STUDIES

Courses available on an external basis are indicated in the Method of Study column in the Course Codes section of this Guide on pages 19-26.

Some Curtin courses are delivered either partially or fully online. In these courses, your resources are available online and you learn using a variety of sources that can include interactive videos and animations, simulations and online workgroups, etc. You need to have internet access for Online Studies. Online courses are marked with superscript 7 in this guide.

SCREENING FOR CLINICAL HEALTH SCIENCES

If you are a student in a course that includes supervised practice (including research) in a clinical setting, you are required to undergo screening for, and vaccination against, a range of infectious diseases before beginning the placement. Criminal record screening is also necessary and, where relevant, Working with Children Checks – see the information for the course on TISC's website.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Universities have many admission pathways, catering for applicants with varying qualifications, such as Year 12 studies, Vocational Education and Training qualifications, tertiary studies, and work and life experience.

At ECU, we believe people from all backgrounds should have the opportunity to access a university education. That's why we've created a range of innovative admission pathways.

Our pathways are available for school leavers and other applicants, and we provide the support and flexibility to anyone wanting to further themselves through education.

While ECU will make every effort to offer you a place in your chosen course, attaining the minimum academic and English competency requirements isn't an automatic guarantee.

Sometimes the number of eligible applicants is greater than the number of places. Where this occurs, offers will be made on a competitive basis.

ACADEMIC ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

ECU offers a variety of ways to meet our minimum academic entry requirements for a course, depending on what you have studied previously, or your work or life experience. We call these admissions pathways.

In addition to meeting our minimum academic requirements through one of our admission pathways, applicants may also be required to have:

- achieved WACE or equivalent (school leaver applicants applying for Bachelor degree courses); and
- satisfied ECU's minimum English requirements (refer to English Competency Requirements on this page, or refer to TISC's website); and
- met any course specific prerequisites.

ADMISSION PATHWAYS

There's more than one way into an undergraduate course at ECU. Whether you're a Year 12 student or you aren't fresh out of year 12, there are multiple pathways for course entry at ECU.

ATAR

If you satisfy our minimum English and academic requirements (refer to page 51) and you:

- have or will obtain an ATAR, you may meet the admissions requirements for your chosen undergraduate course with your ATAR;
- have not or will not obtain an ATAR, you may still have some options as outlined below.
- If you've attended a school on our ECU Access List, your selection rank may be adjusted upwards, and you may meet the requirements for an undergraduate course. Please search ECU Access list at www.ecu.edu.au for more information.

Alternatively, you may:

- be eligible to apply through our Experience Based Entry Scheme; or
- apply for another course with a lower ATAR requirement; or
- consider our UniPrep course which we recommend you include as a preference on your application.

How to apply

School leaver applicants should apply through TISC, unless applying for WA Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA) courses including the Bachelor of Education (Secondary) – Music Education (refer to page 53 for WAAPA courses).

EXPERIENCE BASED ENTRY SCHEME (EBES)

If you satisfy our minimum academic requirements (refer to page 51) you may be eligible to be considered through our Experience Based Entry Scheme.

This pathway assesses your ability to succeed in higher education based on your portfolio of evidence you provide to us. It allows you to be considered for entry to undergraduate courses and caters for:

- school leavers with a near-miss ATAR for their chosen course;
- school leavers who successfully completed at least 3 ATAR courses and 1 General course; and
- other applicants, who may or may not have completed Year 12.

Some courses do not accept applications through this pathway – this will be noted in the published Course Entry requirements for your chosen degree at ECU (ecu.edu.au).

As part of your EBES application, you need to include:

- an introductory letter;
- a résumé;
- two written references; and
- copies of any certificates, awards or academic records if applicable (school leavers must also submit their most recent school report).

EBES applicants will have their supporting documents assessed against specified criteria, including reasons for study and demonstrated preparedness for tertiary level study, and will be admitted to undergraduate level courses based on a competitive process.

Eligibility for this pathway does not guarantee entry into an ECU course at undergraduate level.

QUALIFICATIONS FROM A REGISTERED TRAINING ORGANISATION (RTO)

If you've completed an RTO Certificate IV, and you meet the minimum English and academic requirements (refer to page 51), you may be eligible to be considered for entry to most of our undergraduate courses.

If you've completed an RTO Diploma or Advanced Diploma (or equivalent), you'll be eligible to be considered for entry and may also be eligible to receive credit for recognition of prior learning.

How to apply

School leaver applicants should apply through TISC and upload all relevant documents, unless applying for WA Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA) courses including the Bachelor of Education (Secondary) – Music Education (refer to page 53 for WAAPA courses).

All other applicants should apply directly to ECU and upload supporting documents for assessment (ecu.edu.au/apply).

UNIVERSITY PREPARATION PATHWAYS

If you satisfy ECU's minimum English requirements (refer to page 51), you may wish to consider our UniPrep course as an alternative pathway to our undergraduate courses.

ECU offers the University Preparation Course (UniPrep) at three campuses and the course is available to study online.

On successful completion of the UniPrep course, you're eligible to be considered for entry to most undergraduate courses at ECU subject to you also meeting any course specific requirements.

ECU will make every effort to offer UniPrep graduates a place in their chosen undergraduate course, however, where the number of eligible applicants is greater than the number of places available, offers will be made on a competitive basis. Some courses, such as Nursing, Paramedicine, Imaging Science and Occupational Therapy are very popular and attract a large number of applicants each year.

Australian Citizens, holders of an Australian Permanent Humanitarian Visa, Australian Permanent Residents and New Zealand Citizens are currently eligible to study in a Commonwealth Supported Place, making these courses free, with no up-front or deferred tuition fee. CREATIVE HUMANITIES PORTFOLIO ENTRY

Our CHPE is a pathway for students who are creative and curious people but don't have an ATAR or don't meet the minimum entry requirements for our courses by another means.

This pathway is available for the following courses:

- Bachelor of Design
- Bachelor of Visual Arts
- Bachelor of Communication
- Bachelor of Screen Production
- Bachelor of Journalism and Broadcast Media
- Bachelor of Creative Writing

To be considered through this pathway, in addition to meeting the minimum English and academic requirements (refer to page 51) you'll also need to provide the following:

- an introductory letter;
- a digital Creative Portfolio containing examples of your creative work that show your potential to succeed in your selected course;
- copies of any certificates, awards or academic records if applicable (school leavers must also submit their most recent school report).

How to apply

School leaver applicants should apply through TISC and upload all relevant documents.

All other applicants should apply directly to ECU and upload the required documents (ecu.edu.au/apply).

EDUCATIONAL ACCESS SCHEME (EAS)

ECU recognises that specific circumstances outside the control of an applicant may occur, which negatively impact on the individual's ability to successfully prepare for entry to university study.

Applicants who have been impacted by one off or a series of events such as serious medical conditions or bereavements may be considered for entry.

How to apply

School leaver applicants should apply through TISC and upload all relevant documents, unless applying for WA Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA) courses including the Bachelor of Education (Secondary) – Music Education (refer to page 53 for WAAPA courses).

All other applicants should apply directly to ECU and upload supporting documents for assessment (ecu.edu.au/apply).

To be considered through this scheme, applicants must provide a statement and any supporting documents such as medical evidence required to verify their claims. See page 10 of this Guide for information on the TISC Educational Access Scheme.

WESTERN AUSTRALIAN ACADEMY OF PERFORMING ARTS (WAAPA) COURSES AND BACHELOR OF EDUCATION (SECONDARY) - MUSIC EDUCATION MAJOR

In addition to meeting the minimum English and academic requirements (refer to page 51), entry to WAAPA and the Bachelor of Education (Secondary) - Music Education major is also dependent upon a successful audition and/or interview and/or folio presentation of previous work and/or practical/theoretical test.

Located two hours' drive south of Perth, ECU South West in Bunbury is the largest university campus in regional Western Australia.

Here, you can expect small, personalised class sizes and courses in commerce, science, health science, nursing, social work and teacher education.

The campus features a café, crèche facilities, multi-purpose sports courts, and a library with 24-hour access to a computer lab.

Online Study

If you'd like to study at university but can't attend classes for reasons such as distance, family or work commitments, then online study may be for you. Many of our courses and units are offered online, and our excellent support services are also available to online students.

Part-time Study

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Getting into university is simpler than you might think. Murdoch University have a range of pathway options available, taking into account your high school results, previous studies, and work and life experience.

RECENT SECONDARY EDUCATION

All undergraduate courses at Murdoch, apart from nursing and veterinary science (which have competitive entry) have a guaranteed selection rank required for consideration.

Your selection rank for university entry can be generated by a range of qualifications like an ATAR, International Baccalaureate, vocational qualifications, International Big Picture Learning Credential, media portfolio, experienced based entry, or completion of an enabling course. You can find the minimum selection rank for the courses you are interested in by visiting murdoch.edu.au/courses.

If you don't currently meet Murdoch's admission requirements, check out their range of enabling pathways that can help you build your skills to get into uni.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING (VET) STUDY

If you've completed a Certificate IV (and have met English Language Competency), Diploma, or Advanced Diploma, you're eligible to be considered for admission for most of Murdoch's undergraduate courses. Please visit www.murdoch.edu.au/study for further details on the level of VET qualification that needs to be completed to meet entry for your course.

Qualifications at Diploma level or higher may make you eligible for some Advanced Standing towards your Murdoch degree. Further information on gaining Advanced Standing can be found at www.murdoch.edu.au/study/how-to-apply/recognition-of-prior-learning

MURDOCH ATAR RISE

Murdoch University recognises that not all applicants have the same opportunities to achieve their potential. To help support students to achieve admission for an undergraduate degree, Murdoch's ATAR RISE adjusts the ATAR of eligible students by up to 10.00 ranking points to a maximum Selection Rank of 90.00.

Eligibility is determined by WA secondary school codes, WA permanent residence postcode, declared Indigenous status, and whether you are the first in your family to attend university (this is determined by your parents'/guardians' highest level of education). Students need to meet one of the criteria and have achieved a minimum ATAR of 55 or above to be eligible for the adjustment. COMPETENCE IN ENGLISH

To study at Murdoch University, you will need to meet the specific academic and English Language Competency (ELC) requirements for your chosen course. You can demonstrate ELC by any of the following:

- Successfully completing Year 11 and 12 or 2 years of VET study
- Achieving a scaled mark of 50 or higher in ATAR English, Literature or English as an Additional Language or Dialect, or International Baccalaureate equivalent (Higher Level 3 or better, Standard Level 4 or better).
- A score of 140, or higher in the Written English Component of the Special Tertiary Admission Test (STAT).

Please note, some courses may have a higher ELC requirement. Further information on ELC requirements can be found at murdoch.edu.au/study.

ENABLING COURSES

OnTrack Flex

OnTrack Flex is an equity-focused program that enables students who don't qualify for undergraduate entry through other admission pathways to gain entry to Murdoch University. OnTrack Flex provides an opportunity for you to strengthen your academic skills and understanding of university life and study. OnTrack Flex combines face to face with online learning.

Following successful completion of OnTrack Flex, you'll be eligible to be offered a place in most undergraduate degree courses at Murdoch University that have an indicative ATAR of 70.00, commencing the following semester.

OnTrack Sprint

OnTrack Sprint is a four-week intensive program designed to prepare students who have just missed out on the required ATAR for admission to Murdoch University. It provides an admission pathway for students who have completed their Year 12 schooling within the previous 18 months, generated a Selection Rank between 60.00 and 69.95, or have achieved an 'A' or 'B' average in General

subjects in Year 12, and have met English competency. Applicants must also be Australian citizens, permanent residents, or permanent humanitarian visa holders.

Students who successfully complete the course will be offered direct entry into the Murdoch LLB program.

STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

Murdoch's student learning support services will help you develop the academic and study skills you need to succeed at university and beyond. SELECTION OF COURSES

When you list a Murdoch course as a preference, you're also indicating your major area of study. For most of our courses you can only select one major unless you select one of our combined degrees. Some of our courses are available as combined degrees, which may enable you to graduate with two undergraduate qualifications.

Combined degrees have their own course codes, which you can find via the Course Search facility on TISC's website.

PART-TIME STUDY

Need more flexibility? Part-time study might be an option. You may also be able to change between full-time and part-time study during your course if your circumstances change.

If you're a part-time student, you'll just enrol in fewer units per semester.

EXTERNAL STUDY

Many courses give you the option to study online using materials such as lecture recordings. If coming onto campus isn't always convenient for you, you can complete units and even whole degrees online.

COURSES WITH LIMITED PLACES

Both Nursing and Veterinary Science at Murdoch have quotas on the number of places offered to commencing students, however, we still recommend that you list them as your first preference to maximise your chance of selection. For Veterinary Science, there are a range of other undergraduate courses that can be taken as a pathway to Veterinary Science, allowing an application to transfer on completion of 1 year of study. DEFERRED ADMISSION

If you've been offered a place in an undergraduate degree, you can apply to defer admission for maximum of two years. Deferred students will receive a new letter of offer closer to the time of their preferred intake.

If you're an Australian citizen or a New Zealand citizen or an Australian Permanent Resident and are offered a place at Murdoch University, you'll be offered a Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP), and if you're an Australian citizen or the holder of an Australian permanent humanitarian visa, you're eligible to access the deferred payment loan scheme (HECS-HELP). If you're currently a Permanent Resident and during your enrolment you become an Australian citizen, you may then access HECS-HELP.

ADMISSION CRITERIA

Notre Dame's admission process is multifaceted and considers each applicant on an individual basis. While each program has academic entry requirements, the University also considers the whole person, as we recognise it requires more than academic excellence to succeed in your chosen profession.

We consider your:

- academic record
- personal qualities, talents and non-academic achievements
- contribution to community life.

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

Secondary Education

Applicants who have completed the WACE (ATAR stream), an interstate equivalent, or the IB are eligible to apply for undergraduate degrees at the University of Notre Dame Australia. Entry is based on your Selection Rank (your ATAR + relevant adjustment factors).

Non-ATAR WACE students are eligible to apply for the Tertiary Pathway Program (TPP).

Applicants who have completed Steiner, Montessori or home school curriculums are not eligible for direct entry into undergraduate degrees. They may undertake the TPP or sit a Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT) to gain entry to a number of programs at Notre Dame.

Higher Education Requirements

To be considered for entry to Notre Dame, applicants with previous higher education experience (excluding pathway programs) must have completed a minimum of six months study and passed at least two subjects. Some disciplines require more than this.

Vocational Education and Training (VET) study

VET qualifications are accepted for most undergraduate degrees at Notre Dame.

Applicants will generally need a minimum Certificate IV or Diploma to gain entry into a degree.

Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT)

Applicants who do not meet entry requirements may gain admission to a range of degrees at Notre Dame through completion of a Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT).

Applicants must complete both the written English and multiple-choice sections.

Please note, STAT is not an accepted pathway for entry into Physiotherapy degrees, or into the Assured Pathway to Medicine.

ADJUSTMENT FACTORS

At Notre Dame, we value the whole person.

As such, we offer a range of adjustment factors which are applied to an applicant's ATAR to provide a selection rank for admission.

Applicants can receive up to five adjustment factors (points) from each of the below categories, to a maximum of 10 in total. Please refer to Notre Dame's Adjustment factors webpage: notredame.edu.au/study/applications-and-admissions/how-to-apply/adjustment-factors

Individual Factor Adjustments

At Notre Dame, we consider the whole person and recognise non-academic achievements. In your application you will be invited to provide details of your personal qualities, work and life experience and contribution to community life which will be considered as part of the admissions process.

Depending on the level of your contributions, you can be awarded between one and five adjustment factor points.

Equity Adjustments

Students who have experienced significant educational or other disadvantage due to circumstances beyond their control may qualify for equity adjustments. You will need to complete an application and provide supporting documentation to be considered. You can be awarded between one and five adjustment factor points, depending on the level and/or severity of disadvantage experienced. This can be processed centrally through TISC via their Educational Access Scheme (EAS). See page 10 of this Guide for further details.

Elite Athletes and Artistic Performers

Athletes who compete at – and artistic performers who have had success at – a state, national or international level may be eligible for five adjustment factor points.

If you are an applicant who falls under this category, you must clearly indicate (via the Individual Factors form) and provide evidence (by uploading supporting documentation) that you are an elite athlete or artistic performer at the time of your application, in order to have adjustment factor points applied.

University Priority Groups

Notre Dame recognises Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, along with Australian Defence Force (ADF) personnel, as priority groups who may be eligible for five adjustment factor points as part of their application.

Points will be applied automatically for applicants who indicate that they identify as part of these priority groups.

Subject Performance

Current and recent school leavers who achieve outstanding results in school subjects which are relevant to their chosen program at Notre Dame will receive either two, three or five adjustment factor points, depending on the level of results achieved. These will be applied automatically.

Location Adjustments

Current and recent school leavers who live, or have attended school, in designated areas may be eligible for location-based adjustment factors.

Adjustment points will be applied to the following:

- if the area you live in or attended school in is classified as being of socioeconomic or socio-educational disadvantage
- if you attended a school in an area classified as rural or regional

ENGLISH LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY REQUIREMENTS

The University of Notre Dame Australia requires all applicants, both domestic and international, to achieve English language proficiency as well as minimum academic requirements. This ensures that applicants are sufficiently competent in the English language to participate effectively in their chosen program and achieve the expected program outcomes.

Successful completion of secondary studies in Australia is sufficient to meet the English language proficiency requirements for entry to most of our degrees.

Some disciplines (Education and Nursing) have specific English language requirements stipulated by the accrediting bodies. These must be satisfied in addition to the University's English language proficiency requirements. Please see Notre Dame's English language proficiency requirements page: www.notredame.edu.au/study/applications-and-admissions/admission-requirements/english-language-requirements for further information.

The English language proficiency requirements do not apply to our pathway programs, e.g. Tertiary Pathway Program (TPP).

MINIMUM AGE REQUIREMENTS

If you are a domestic student, you are required to be 17 years of age or older at the commencement of the semester to enter a Notre Dame undergraduate degree. If you are an international student requiring a visa to study in Australia, you must be 18 years old at the time of enrolment at Notre Dame.

Exceptions to the minimum age requirements will be considered on a case-by-case basis and, if granted, restrictions on enrolment may be imposed.

DISCIPLINE-SPECIFIC ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Some programs have specific requirements such as evidence of registration, practice licenses or specific industry or professional experience. These requirements can be found in the relevant program pages on our website: notredame.edu.au/study.

ENTRY PATHWAYS

TERTIARY PATHWAY PROGRAM

Notre Dame's Tertiary Pathway Program (TPP) is designed for students who have not met the requirements for entry into the University's undergraduate degree programs. Following successful completion of the TPP, students may gain entry to complete an undergraduate program in the following areas**:

- Arts & Sciences
- Business
- Education
- Health Sciences
- Nursing
- Philosophy & Theology

**For some programs, direct entry is not possible through the TPP. Other pathways to these programs are available. Visit notredame.edu.au/study/pathways to find out more.

YOUNG ACHIEVERS EARLY OFFER PROGRAM

Year 12 students can apply directly to Notre Dame's Young Achievers Early Offer Program or apply via TISC.

TISC applicants must upload their Year 12 mid-year report as part of their application. Semester 2 reports may also be considered in later offer rounds.

UNIPATH PROGRAM

Notre Dame's UniPath Program is designed for Year 12 high school students who are on a Non-ATAR pathway. Successful completion of the program will guarantee direct entry into many undergraduate programs at Notre Dame. Students can begin their pathway into university while completing Year 12. UNDERGRADUATE PATHWAYS TO MEDICINE AND PHYSIO

PRIORITY PATHWAY – MEDICINE

A priority pathway is available for graduates who consistently achieve top results throughout their undergraduate Bachelor of Biomedical Science degree (including biomedical science double degrees) at The University of Notre Dame Australia. These candidates are eligible to apply to the MD via the Doctor of Medicine admission process.

PRIORITY PATHWAY - PHYSIOTHERAPY*

From 2025, Notre Dame will be offering a pathway into the postgraduate Master of Physiotherapy degree on the Fremantle campus. To be eligible for this pathway, applicants must gain entry into either the Bachelor of Exercise and Sports Science or the Bachelor of Biomedical Science degrees, and meet all prescribed minimum admission requirements related to this pathway. ASSURED PATHWAY – MEDICINE

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

We're here to help you achieve your full potential and offer many different entry pathways to study at UWA. You can apply to UWA based on your Year 12 studies, vocational education and training qualifications, tertiary studies, life, and work experience.

GENERAL ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- Entry to most courses is assessed on your ATAR or equivalent (check the ATAR for your chosen course or your eligibility for an ATAR adjustment).
- You can also gain entry into several UWA bachelor's degrees through Experience-based entry.
- English language requirements (see "English Language Competence").

Prerequisites

- Some courses and majors have prerequisite subjects that require a final scaled score of 50 or higher in an ATAR or equivalent subject, like Mathematics Applications or Chemistry.
- There are several courses and majors that don't have prerequisites, and in many cases, if you don't meet the prerequisites, you can take a bridging or foundational unit in your first year.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE COMPETENCE

Successful university study requires a certain level of English language skills. In most cases, you'll be able to demonstrate English language competence through satisfactory performance in the required English subjects at school (final scaled score of 50 or above in an ATAR English subject). If you're unable to demonstrate English language competence in this way, you'll need satisfactory performance in an alternative UWA-approved test of English or through completion of a UWA communications unit.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS FOR MEDICINE OR DENTISTRY

- A minimum ATAR of 98 is required to be considered for school leaver entry.
- Sit the UCAT ANZ during the year of application (registrations usually close during May, and test sittings take place during July and August).
- Lodge a TISC application.
- Complete an interview.
- Meet the English requirements (see "English Language Competence").
- Quota eligibility: Indigenous, Rural, Broadway and/or High Academic Achievers (HAA - Western Australian school leavers who meet the ATAR minimum). There are also a small number of places available for domestic school leavers who have completed Year 12 or equivalent at a school outside of Western Australia and have achieved a minimum ATAR or equivalent.

CHOOSE YOUR ENTRY PATHWAY

There are many ways to start your journey at UWA. Explore the entry pathways below or if you're not sure what entry pathway is right for you, get in touch with the team at UWA for advice.

Aboriginal Orientation Course

If you don't meet the entry requirements or just want to better prepare for uni study, this free 14-week course gives you entry to most bachelor's degrees and the study skills to succeed.

AccessUWA

With AccessUWA you can study individual units of your choice at UWA without having to enrol in a bachelor's degree. Upon successful completion of a minimum number of four units (24 credit points), you can apply for a comprehensive bachelor's degree based on your AccessUWA results.

Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR)

ATAR tells you your position relative to other students in your year. It's important to remember that it's a ranking, not a percentage. It's also the most direct way as a school leaver to get into the bachelor's degree of your choice.

There are two ATAR entry pathways:

ATAR based entry

You can secure your place at UWA with an ATAR of 75 or above, or with an ATAR of 70 (for Broadway UWA, Fairway UWA, First in Family or Indigenous applicants). Use your final Year 12 ATAR to apply.

Predicted ATAR entry

We'll be providing offers based on your predicted ATAR from your Year 11 results. You'll need a minimum predicted ATAR of 80, or an ATAR of 78 (for Broadway UWA, Fairway UWA, First in Family or Indigenous applicants) and meet the entry requirements for your nominated course to receive an offer.

If your predicted ATAR does not meet the early offer entry requirements for your nominated UWA course, you'll receive a conditional offer – conditional that you satisfy the ATAR requirement for your chosen course through your final Year 12 ATAR, satisfying the requirements for Experience-based entry or by successfully completing STAT.

You can use the predicted ATAR entry pathway to apply for admission to our bachelor's degrees, as well as our Assured Pathways to Law, Teaching, Architecture and Translation Studies. The Predicted ATAR entry pathway is not applicable for Assured Pathways to Medicine, Dentistry, and Podiatry or the Bachelor of Biomedicine (Specialised).

Broadway UWA

If you've completed your entire Year 12 studies at a Broadway UWA school, you'll receive an automated ATAR adjustment.

Diploma Entry Pathway

If you've completed an AQF Level 5 qualification (Diploma) or above, you may be able to use this for admission to bachelor's degrees at UWA.

Early Offers

If you're currently in Year 12, you can apply early for 2025 entry through TISC Online before Friday 29 November 2024. Tick your application off your list so it's one less thing you need to think about and spend that time focusing on your final exams.

You can apply for an Early Offer for all bachelor's degrees excluding Assured Pathways to Medicine, Dentistry, Podiatric Medicine, or the Bachelor of Biomedicine (Specialised).

We'll be able to assess your application in four ways – your predicted ATAR, your actual ATAR (if this is higher than your predicted), Experience-based entry or STAT.

Educational Access Scheme (EAS)

The Educational Access Scheme (EAS) can help you gain access to uni if you've experienced exceptional circumstances during senior secondary schooling. See page 10.

Experience-based entry

With or without an ATAR, Experience-based entry allows you to apply using a combination of academic and life experiences with your results. TAFE qualifications, ATAR subjects, work experience, volunteering, and sporting achievements can all count towards entry into several of UWA's bachelor's degrees.

Fairway UWA

If you're challenged by location, economic or other factors, complete the Fairway support program in Year 12 to gain entry to our bachelor's degrees with an ATAR of 70 or above.

First in Family

If your parents or guardians have not completed a university-level degree, you may be eligible for a place at UWA through the First in Family program.

Higher Education Study

If you have previously studied at a bachelor's degree level and have successfully completed one full-time (or equivalent) semester, you can apply for entry to UWA.

Indigenous Provisional Entry Scheme

If you're an Indigenous student and don't meet the required ATAR or are mature-age and have a strong educational or employment background, you may be eligible for entry through this pathway.

International Baccalaureate (IB)

UWA welcomes IB students to apply and your IB score will be converted into an equivalent ATAR.

Non-school Leavers

We offer pathways if you're starting at university after working, having time off or completing TAFE study or study at another university.

Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT)

The STAT is a national test that provides a pathway to tertiary study if you don't meet the university entry requirements or English language requirements. You must complete the STAT Multiple Choice and Written English sections of the test to meet either requirement. You can use your results in the STAT to gain entry to several of our bachelor's degrees.

UWA Smart Start

Boost your confidence and equip yourself with the skills to succeed in your university degree course by enrolling in our unique university preparation course in Albany.

UWA+ Starter

Start your uni experience early by completing UWA micro-credentials while you're still in school. Successfully completed UWA+ Starter micro-credentials can also contribute towards your admission to UWA via Experience-based entry.

HOW TO APPLY

All current WA Year 12 school leaver applications for 2025 entry should be submitted through TISC, including applications for Early Offers, and for UWA's Assured Pathways to Medicine, Dentistry, Podiatric Medicine, or the Bachelor of Biomedicine (Specialised). Ensure you check course deadlines.

If you are a recent school leaver or a non-school leaver and meet the criteria for one of our entry pathways, you should also apply through TISC.

All other applicants should apply direct to UWA and upload all relevant supporting documents.

PART-TIME STUDY

Part-time study is available for most courses. It's important to note that most classes are conducted during normal business hours.

PERMANENT RESIDENCY

If you're applying for an Assured Pathway to Medicine, Dental Medicine, or Podiatric Medicine you must be granted permanent residency by Monday 30 September 2024 – the closing date for application to these courses. Applicants for all other courses must be granted Australian permanent resident status by the final closing date for TISC applications.

If you haven't achieved permanent residency by this date, you should apply as an international student for a full-fee place directly through UWA.
